

Some of our readers may not have heard about it, so we are carrying elsewhere in this issue a story about Dimmitt's proposed \$20 million wet grain processing plant.

We have heard several local residents complain that Friona would have been a more logical location for such a plant. We have to agree that we would rather have seen it here, but we have to take our hats off to the Dimmitt people responsible for taking the initiative on such a program.

True, just as we announced in last week's issue of the Star, Parmer County produces about 40 per cent more maize than does Castro County. Also, rail and highway facilities in Friona are better than those at the Castro County seat.

But, the fact of the matter is that a group of Dimmitt residents saw the feasibility of such a plant, and went out after it for their town. And, they got it.

We must congratulate Dimmitt on the achievement. It is a great Chamber of Commerce plug. And with dues-paying time at hand for our local Chamber of Commerce, it is a good reminder that the local Chamber program needs 100 per cent support, if it is to hire a full-time manager, so as to keep Friona's "name in the hat" for any future industrial expansions.

We have made a good start toward industry in Friona in recent years, what with such things as Friona Feed Yards, the Golden Spread Spudnut Corp., and only recently Billy Graham Foods, Inc. All of these should make (and are making) their impact on the local economy.

So—we urge you to return your Chamber of Commerce check, at least for the suggested amount, more if you can afford it. Return it immediately so that the local Chamber of Commerce program will not be stalled.

Back to the grain plant at Dimmitt: while we'd rather have had the plant here, we must realize the tremendous economical boost it will be for farmers in our area. It's just like the Holly Sugar plant in Hereford — it assures more cash for our crops.

Grain producers should be exuberant over the prospect for another local market for the area's number one crop. We are real proud of the way that grain producers have gone out in recent years and assured more and better markets for their grain. The Dimmitt plant is just another in a long line of success stories along this line.

While other industries, such as cotton, have been slow to promote their industry (and results are being felt in acreage cuts, etc.), the grain industry continues to make giant strides in providing markets for their crop, which area farmers are producing in ever-increasing abundance.

For instance, the Grain Sorghum Producers Association was started some 10 years for promotion purposes. Use of grain as food for livestock has increased in this period from 179 million bushels to 479 million bushels per year. Exports to foreign countries have jumped from 22 million bushels to over 200 million bushels in 1965.

Establishment of Friona Feed Yards made a ready market for local grain. The 26,000 - capacity lot currently uses 350,000 pounds of grain per day.

The new wet milling plant at Dimmitt is expected to more than double the commercial and industrial use of grain sorghum.

When you stop and think a moment, Dimmitt may not prove as a bad location for the wet mill plant as it might at first blush.

True, it isn't on the best rail-way line, but consider the fact that Dimmitt is the capital Castro County, the state's third-largest grain producing county. Parmer County, perennial champion, is adjacent to the west, and Hale County, which has been runnerup to Parmer for years, is just to the south of Castro.

## JP RACE IS FEATURE

# Democratic Runoff To Be Held On Saturday

A Democratic runoff, or second primary, will be held in Parmer County Saturday, with a light turnout expected, although there will be local races for some precinct voters.

Two contested races will face most county voters on the runoff ballot Saturday. In precinct one, incumbent

Justice of the Peace Walter Loveless faces J.W. Roberts in the runoff. Then at Bovina, Lucille Killough, incumbent, faces Wilbur Charles.

The only state race to reach the runoff stage was that of Attorney-General, where two candidates seek the party nomination for the office being vacated by senatorial candidate Wag-

goner Carr. Crawford Martin, who led the voting in the first primary, meets Franklin Spears. Martin had a majority of the votes cast in Parmer County at the first primary, but failed to get the majority.

Roberts led the Friona JP voting in the first primary with 207 votes. Loveless had 142

votes, and the third candidate Mrs. Ben McDonald, had 82. Charles gained the runoff at Bovina on the strength of a write-in campaign.

A total of 1379 voters turned out for the first primary, including 412 at Friona. A much lighter turnout is anticipated for Saturday's voting.

# Year's Best Rain Falls

The best rain of 1966—in fact the best measured in Friona in over ten months, was received in Friona Tuesday night.

The fall measured .90 inches in Friona, and apparently went over the inch mark on farmland throughout the area.

The measurement in Friona was the largest measurement on an individual date since the night of July 28-29, 1965, when 1.31 inches fell. Tuesday night's rain, coupled, with that which fell last Saturday afternoon, (.51) totaled more than had been measured in Friona for all of 1966 previously.

For the past week, Friona measured 1.51 inches. Prior to the week, a total of 1.17 inches had been measured by the City of Friona for 1966.

The rain apparently was fairly general. An inch and more was measured west of Friona.

This was also the report near Black, and at other points east of Friona.

Lazbuddie also received a rain Tuesday night.

The Saturday rain was accompanied by some hail, fairly heavy spots, so that some farmers were to be forced to plant young crops over.

Probably the best aspect of Tuesday's rain was the way it fell . . . gently. There was no report of any hail during Tuesday's soaking showers.

It is early for New Year's resolutions but won't you resolve to give the game back to the kids? Let the coaches and umpires run the games so that we can enjoy the best Little League season that Friona has ever known.

## Former FHS Student Describes Viet Nam

A former student of Friona High School, currently a Marine Private First Class stationed in Viet Nam, spent almost an entire school term in the Southwest, but didn't learn to appreciate our arid climate. He was a native of Norristown, Pennsylvania, and made his home with the Steve Struves during the 1963-64 school term.

Mike Baronowski, son of Mrs. Bette R. Dickey of Norristown, wrote a letter to his mother recently and she thought other parents might be interested in knowing what servicemen in Viet Nam write home about.

She sent the letter to the Norristown Times-Herald. A clipping from the paper was sent to the Struves. Mail addressed as follows will be delivered to Mike.

PFC Michael A. Baronowski, 2174848, L Company, 3rd, Battalion, 3rd, Marines, 3rd, Marine Division Rein, FMF, Republic of Viet Nam, FPO San Francisco, Calif. 96602.

The letter was written as follows: "I took my first shower since Okinawa last night. I don't remember at any time in my life being filthier. The dust and the heat are like nothing that I've ever experienced.

This climate makes Texas and New Mexico look like Mermaid Lake. Where there isn't dust there is water. Rivers and streams everywhere, but the water is full of germs, although crystal clear.

"From our outpost, the country looks like a dream world—some kind of Utopia Wonderland. About 15 miles away and on all sides except to the West are pale blue mountain ranges that look like they stretch to the clouds. There are hundreds of rice paddies, each covering about 1/8 - mile before the terrain is broken by dense wooded areas (actually the trees look like monstrous dry seaweed) and the intricate system of waterways. From up on the hill it resembles a huge, blue-green half - eaten waffle.

"Every once in a while we see a Vietnamese woman or child riding through the paddies on the back of a big water buffalo they call 'Mondl.'

"Every morning the Mondl swarm into the paddies in a herd and then come the Vietnamese women and children to pick their junk. I don't know whether they pick the same buffalo each day but its the same story every day

from the first ray of sunlight until almost dark. They seem to be domestic during the day and run wild at night.

"You've asked me what I want you to send—some small cans of fruit or juice would be like a gift from heaven.

"I've been initiated, a sniper fired eight rounds at us from a clump of trees, no more than fifth meters from our emplacement. The shots were close but missed so they didn't count. Our return fire failed to reach him, we discovered as soon as it got daylight. They tell me that I'll get used to it. Maybe. But not for a good while.

"Our encampment is well protected by sandbag walls and we have plenty of ammunition, my buddies are the fellows from 'Harvest Moon,' so I am in good hands."

## Carr Named Outstanding A-G

Texas Attorney General Waggoner Carr has been named the nation's "Outstanding Attorney General" by the National Association of Attorneys General at its 60th annual convention in Cleveland, Ohio.

By unanimous vote, the assembled attorneys general of the fifty states awarded Carr the Wyman Award which is presented each year to the attorney general "who has done more to advance the objectives of the National Association of Attorneys General to help make the United States a better place for all in which to live."

The announcement of the award was made by the President of the national association Louisiana Attorney General Jack P.F. Gremillion. The award, highest honor that the nation's attorneys general can bestow upon one of their members, was first initiated in 1957. Last year's winner was Clarence Meyer of Nebraska.

## Raymond Euler Named Tower Campaign Mgr.

# Health Spending Increases, Physicians' Share Declines

CHICAGO—Americans are increasing spending for health care.

But they still spend more for tobacco than for hospital care, and more for cosmetics and haircuts than for doctor bills, reports The AMA News, published by the American Medical Association.

Spending for health care totaled \$25.2 billion in 1964, according to figures of the U.S. Department of Commerce. That's an increase of 7.8 per cent from the \$23.4 billion spent in 1963.

Hospitals receive the largest share of health-care spending—about 30 cents of every dollar. The total spent for hospital care in 1964 was \$7.6 billion. This compares with \$7.8 bil-

lion spent on tobacco products.

Other portions of the health-care dollar are divided among drugs, 17 cents; dentists, 10 cents; health insurance, 7 cents; appliances, 4 cents, and miscellaneous expenses, 5 cents.

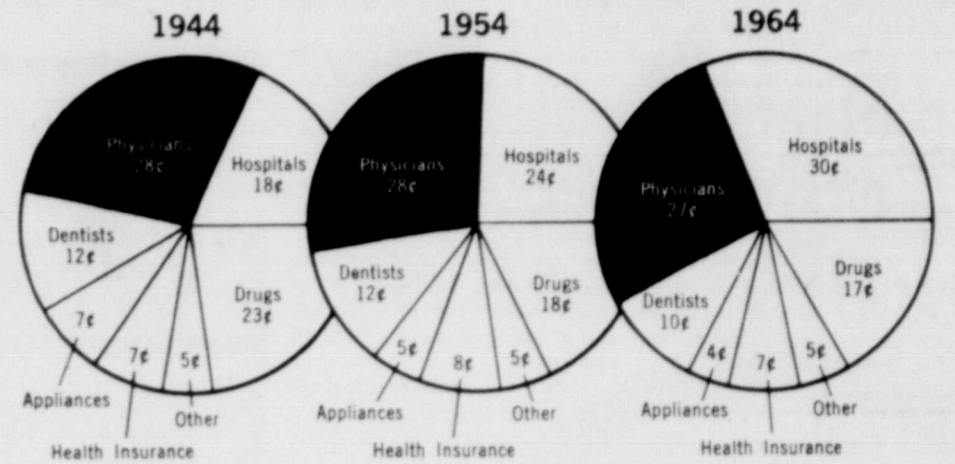
The remaining 27 cents goes to physicians. This percentage has declined slightly over the years. Twenty years ago, physicians received about 28 cents of every dollar spent on health care.

Expenditures for physicians' services totaled \$6.8 billion in 1964, compared to \$7 billion spent on personal items such as cosmetics, haircuts, and toiletries.

health-care dollar 10 years earlier: hospitals, 24 cents; physicians, 28 cents; drugs, 18 cents; dentists, 12 cents; health insurance, 8 cents; appliances, 5 cents, and the other services, 5 cents.

The Department of Commerce reported these expenditures for health care in 1964:

Hospitals, \$7.6 billion, up 12.5 per cent over 1963; physicians, \$6.8 billion, up 5.5 per cent over 1963; drugs, \$4.4 billion, up 5.2 per cent; dentists, \$2.4 billion, up 5.8 per cent; health insurance, \$1.8 billion, up 6.3 per cent; appliances, \$1.1 billion, up 9.7 per cent, and other services, \$1.2 billion, up 6.9 per cent over 1963.

"We expect around 30 members to participate in the show" states Joe Van Zandt, Parmer County Agent.

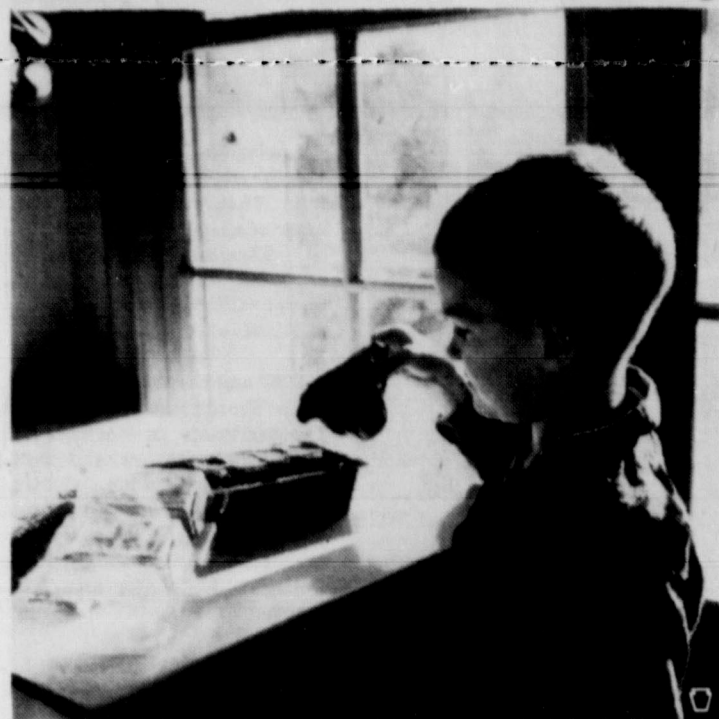

### Miniature Greenhouse For Seed Starting



Starting seeds in this new miniature greenhouse planter is easy as can be. Any youngster can start seeds all by himself.

A new type of seed starter is like a greenhouse in miniature. It consists of 3 groups of 6 little peat pots (18 in all) set in a plastic tray and covered with a transparent plastic top which, when in place, insures greenhouse conditions to the seedlings.

The little pots are already filled with a growing medium and pre-planted with seeds (2 or more to each pot) of three of these flowers: petunias, shade plants, zinnias, marigolds, sweet peas or tomatoes.

To start any of these seeds it is necessary only to set the greenhouse on a level surface; remove the aluminum foil cover and foam padding which hold seeds and growing medium in place. Then water is poured into each of the three sections of the planter through holes in the outer plastic tray. The transparent cover is set on top and then you can watch the seeds grow.

After sprouts appear in all the pots the top is removed — otherwise the temperature might be

too hot for best plant growth. After four or more leaves have formed on each seedling, plants may be moved to larger containers or directly into the garden if frost is over.

It's so easy to transplant the seedlings — just separate the peat pots and plant them. They'll disappear gradually as water and weather do their work. As you must do every year, figure backward from the frost-free date in your area to decide when to start seeds of flowers or vegetables indoors. It will take from 1 to 3 weeks for seeds to sprout and another 3 weeks or more to grow to transplanting size.

Jones' appointment was announced by Robert W. Milam, M.D., of McAllen, Chairman of the Case Service Committee.

Last year the Society aided 14,395 Texans in the form of treatments, services, equipment loans and related aids. The Society is carrying out a program to reach every disabled person in the state who needs assistance. This program is to insure that every disabled child and adult has an equal opportunity at a normal way of life.

Jones urged that any person

needing assistance from the Eastern Seal Society for Crippled Children contact him at the Security State Bank at Farwell. There is no charge for these services, he added.

Disabled Texans are aided by the Texas Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults regardless of age, race, cause of disability or financial status. Jones said that to secure services, a disabled person or their family should contact him.

The Texas Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults is the oldest organization providing direct care and treatment for the crippled children and adults of Texas.

Due care is a legal phrase, but the lack of it causes the deaths of many Americans every year.



### On The Farm In Parmer County

Wheat and small grains will be the main topic of discussion at the agricultural field day set for 1:30 p.m. June 3 at the North Plains Research Field at Etter.

The program calls for 90 minutes of short talks and a tour of the facility.

The discussions of research projects will provide useful information that should be of particular interest to farmers in this area.

Lead-off speaker at the field day will be Dr. Allen Wiese who will discuss weed control in grain sorghum, wheat and soybeans.

John Shipley, who coordinates research at the field, will discuss the economic implications of current irrigation research projects. His assistant, Cecil Regire, will present a short report on the overall research program at the field.

Other topics to be discussed by researchers are response of fertilizer applications on wheat and grain sorghum, small grain improvements and hybrid wheat possibilities, and principal insect pests and related problems on the North Plains.

The North Plains Research Field, located one-mile east and a half-mile north of Etter, was established in 1964 primarily to study farm production problems of the area north of the Canadian River.

However, the information presented at the field day will apply in large part to our area, we believe. If anyone wants to attend the field day Friday, contact your County Agent.

**COTTON INSECTS**  
Cotton producers need to be checking their cotton for thrip damage. We can expect to see some thrip damage show up in cotton about now.

For thrips begin control measures as soon as damage is apparent on seedling plants. Damage is characterized by wilted, deformed and blackened leaves. Silvering of the lower leaf surface also is common. Apply sprays at 7-day intervals if infestation persists.

Insecticides recommended

are listed below as the pounds per acre of actual insecticide to be applied as a spray follow each insecticide recommended: Dieldrin + DDT @ 0.2 - 0.25 + 5 lb; Guthion @ 1.25 to 0.25 lb; Strobane - DDT (2-1 Mixture) @ 1.25 to 2.25 lbs.; Sevin @ 0.5 to 1.0 lb; Toxaphene DDT (2-1 mixture) @ 1.25 to 2.25 lb.; Heptachlor + DDT @ 0.25 - 0.375 + 0.5 lb; Endrin - DDT @ 0.2 - 0.3 + 0.5 lb; and Bidrin @ 0.1 - 0.25 lb.

We encourage growers to come by and pick up a new 1966 Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects. This publication lists the latest recommendations for controlling all kinds of cotton insects for the High Plains area.

**SPRAY PIGS**  
It's a good idea to have two spraying rigs. One should be used for applying herbicides and the other for insecticides. To be extra safe, mark the herbicide sprayer in some way so you'll be able to tell it at a glance.

Without careful decontamination, there will always be herbicide traces left in the sprayer which can retard or kill your crops. If you must use the same sprayer for both herbicides and insecticides, the following steps will usually rid your sprayer of herbicide.

Rinse sprayer system with either 2 to 4 pounds of washing soda or 2 quarts of household ammonia in 30 gallons of water. Circulation mixture through sprayer and allow to stand several minutes before draining.

Repeat above step. Remove all rubber hose connections.

Repeat step one, and allow mixture to remain in sprayer for several hours. Drain and rinse with clean water.

Fill tank with clear water and spray on tomato plant. If tomato plant does not wilt, you can be relatively sure the herbicide effect is gone from the sprayer — for the present at least. If the sprayer tank is rusted, the herbicide will show up each time rust is flaked off the sprayer tank.

The Spohns purchased land several miles north and were unable to secure domestic water, so were allowed by the land company to select another plot of ground and chose the site on which the house now stands.

Members of the Spohn family owned the land until it was sold to Ralph Wilson about two years ago. Bob Spohn, one of the sons, lived in the three room house until he moved to Friona in 1964.

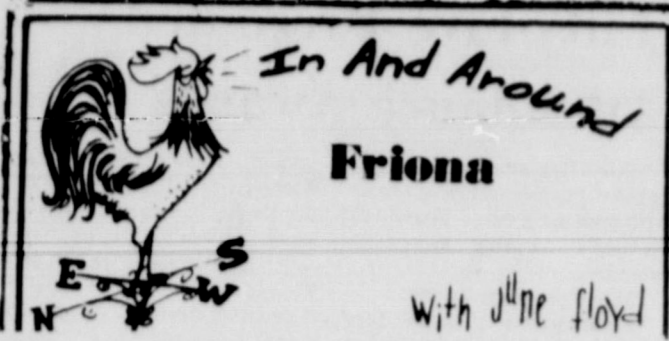

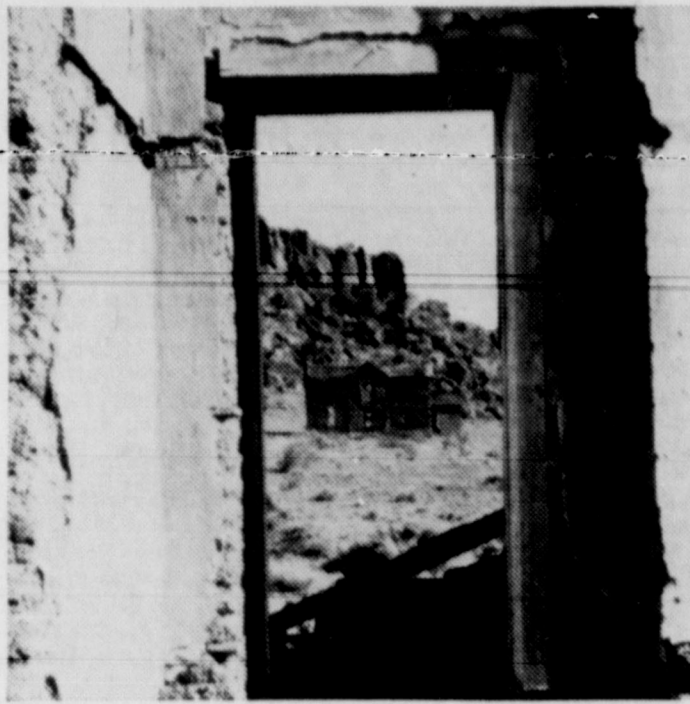
### Referendum Defeated

In the cotton referendum completed last week, tabulated on May 27, Farmer County cotton producers voted against the transfer of cotton acreage outside the county. This means that we will not (cannot) lose any of our county cotton acreage to another county through sale and lease of allotments.

The balloting was conducted by mail and cotton producers responded extremely well, according to Prentice Mills, ASCS office manager. More than 70 percent of the eligible voters in the county cast their ballots.

There were 942 eligible votes to cast.

There were 414 votes in favor of cotton transfers and 528 votes cast opposing cotton transfers.

## Dimmitt To Build Huge Grain Plant

Announcement was made recently in Dimmitt that Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., will finance construction of a wet grain sorghum milling plant.

The plant will be under the supervision of Union Starch and Refining Company, which will construct, manage operation of the plant, and market the product.

Cost of the plant is estimated at \$20,000,000. The plant eventually will employ some 100 people, with an annual payroll in excess of \$1,000,000.

Base products to be manufactured by the plant are: starch, grain sorghum sugars, dextrose, glucose, grain sorghum oil, gluten feed, gluten meal and grain sorghum oil meal.

The starch produced will be used in custards, puddings, etc.,

in addition to being used in textiles, paper, adhesives, and chemicals. Grain sorghum sugar, a further conversion of the starch beyond the syrup stage, is used extensively in the beverage and food manufacturing industries, especially in candy, tobacco and flavoring syrups.

Glucose is used in the manufacturing of pharmaceuticals, cough syrup, rayon textiles, dyes or ink, chewing gum, candy, jams, jellies, preservers, frozen fruits, icings and frostings.

Grain sorghum oil is used in the manufacturing of salad oils, mayonaisse, oleo-margarine, pharmaceuticals, soap and cooking oils.

Gluten feed, meal and grain sorghum oil meal are products obtained during the manufacturing process and are sold to feed mixers as a component in cat-
