The percussion was treated to a demonstration and lecture by one of the world's finest drummers, Joe Morello f ormer member of the Dave Brubeck Quartet.

Friday afternoon the band participated in concert and sightreading contest. Most of the band members felt the concert performance was one of the best. One of the judges for this event was Fred Prentice, former Rankin Band Director.







Driving too fast for conditions results in 41 percent of accidents, down from 51 percent in 1962. Driving while drinking accounted for 38 percent in 1968—a figure that has remained consistent a 37 to 39 percent for the past si years.
