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

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


THE CHANGES-

For one thing, armed conflicts are mighty expensive things nowadays and it would take the support of some outside power to finance any sizeable uprising in the United States. That would be a mighty hard thing to carry out. Secondly, such a conflict would have absolutely no chance of success

Changes there will be and a 'revolution'' may well take place here but it will not be carried out by force-

When you look back twenty years, it's not too difficult to see that we have already had "revolution', particularly in the matter of civil rights, and twenty years from now, it may well be still going on.

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



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

New Effort Planned on Law Enforcing

A local effort to reduce crime and to improve law enforcement in West Texas has been initiated by the Permian Basin Law Enforcement Advisory Committee.

This committee, representing seventeen counties of West Texas, has recommended a regional inservice training program for law enforcement officers and the establishment of a continuing study of local law enforcement needs. Among those serving on the committe is Upton County Judge Allen Moore-

This recommendation grew out of an extensive survey conducted by Odessa College in March The survey inventoried equipment. services, and needs of the entire justice system of the seventeencounty region. This includes the sheriffs and police departments and the city, county, and district courts.

After the completion of the survey, the twenty-member Advisory Committee recommended that additional in-service training centers be established in the area and that existing ones be expanded. These centers will be within driving distance of all the cities in the region. Big Spring, Midland, Odessa, Andrews and Fort Stockton were suggested locations.

The Advisory Committee requested that the State of Texas contribute 60 percent of the \$14.-160 that this training program is expected to cost.

The Committee also suggested a central employment pool to recruit applicants, the adoption of an objective merit system to reward qualified officers and the elevation of standards and salaries of law enforcement personnel

Other recommendations include a plan calling for the expansion of Police Science Programs of Howard Junior College and Odessa College The Committe also called for the adoption of a standardized system of records

and procedures of the separate law enforcement agencies within the region and the establishment of a central information center that would tie into a central office in Austin.

The Committee also urged the creation of a permanent comittee that would continue to assess law enforcement needs and to make recommendations to law enforcement agencies.

Counties included within this regional study are Andrews, Borden, Crane, Dawson, Ector Gaines Glasscock, Howard, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward and Winkler.


