SUMMER ACTIVITY PROGRAM TO START MONDAY AT SCHOOL

For the second year in a row Rankin Schools will sponsor a summer activity program. This year's program will get underway next Monday and will continue through the latter part of July.

Open to both boys and girls, any student who wishes to participate and who has not already signed up may do so next Monday.

Instruction will be under the supervision of coaches Bill Beasley and Wayne Mitchell with the pace of activities to be set by

the participating students themselves. Activities offered will include weight lifting, track, flag football, tennis, volleyball, swimming and similar recreational outlets.

Boys and girls who will be in Grades 6, 7 and 8 next fall are to hold their "workouts" in the mornings. Those who will be in Grades 9 through 12 next fall are to hold their activities in the afternoon and evening after working hours.



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

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

pay reparations to the blacks for past injustices. In the first place, many of these churches have Negroes among their membership and since any money a church might decide to pay would come from combined donations, it's a little like robbing Peter to pay Paul.

But this is a minor point. The thing that makes it close to hilarious to even think of such a thing is the fact that Negroes are not the only ones who have suffered injustices during the history of this nation. There are cases and causes that could be made on these grounds for a dozen or so nationalities and uncountable instances of individual situations white, black, yellow, green or red.

And why churches? Why not the government for after all the churches are generally operated as single units and one might be guilty as charged while another might have a long record of social service to all races.

Actually, what we have here is someone who has thought up a good way to draw attention to himself and is playing the part with the idea in mind that anything that comes of it will be of benefit—primarily to him and his supporters.

I seriously doubt that the average Negro in this country has and more idea that churches owe him a chunk of money than any of the rest of us. I think it has been pretty well agreed that the Negro people are due a better shake in this country than they have gotten in the past and that a big majoriy of people are willing to give it to them. The same can be said for practically every minority as we grow more liberal in our outlook and more aware of how others live.

Aside from that, they probably realize that they re going to have to scratch out their living right along with everybody else.

I'll bet that if all the money in

the U. S. was divided equally among each man, woman and child, it wouldn't be six months before it would again be piled up on about the same proportion as it now stands. Some seem to have a knack for getting money together—some don't—and the color of ones skin doesn't seem to have much to do with it.

REPORT FROM AUSTIN BY GEORGE BAKER State Rep., 66th District

As the 61st Legislature heads into final days of the regular session it still is uncertain-at least at the time of writing this report-that a solution has yet been found to the division of opinion between Gov. Preston Smith and his sponsorship of two-year budgeting and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Speaker Gus Mutscher in their position favoring single year appropriations.

The week saw action in the House on many bills of importance, with some going through and others failing.

Of great interest was the Kothmann resolution to submit the horse racing issut o voters in a constitutional amendment in November, 1970-

The issue was debated in a circus - type atmosphere Kothmann's presentation started off on a light note, and the matter ended in upoarous laughter at numerous points-but beneth all the levity was an issue of intense interest to many Texans-

Most amazing to all was the 84-57 margin by which the measure lost. Most observers had predicted a defeat, on the basis of a required 2/3 majority voteor 100 aye votes-but when only 57 members voted for the mansure it astounded almost everyone. Apparently the mood of lev ity in which the matter was debated lost some expected sup-

I voted with the majority against the proposal, realizing that this would be a vote disappointing to many voters in the 66th district.

In referendums last summer a majority of the total voters in the 66th district voted again. (the legalization of pare-mutual betting, which the amendment provided on a local option basis-I was following both that mandate and my own convictions in the matter.

Earlier I had issued a statement in opposition to a pay raise amendment for legislators setting a maximum salary pegged to of district

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Both Senate and House since have adopted enabling legislation which would set the annual salary at a more realistic figure-\$9,800 in the Senate bill, amended to \$6,800 by House action, and referred back to the Senate.

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

KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

The number of head of livestock will be small but participants in the Texas 4-H Roundup. scheduled for June 3-4 at Texas A&M University, will include some 1800 4-H Club members.

The 4-H members will come from every section of the state and the only livestock involved will be that used in judging and demonstration contests. State 4-H club leaders say that in addition to the 4-H members, approximately 250 county and assistant County Extension agents and a dult 4-H leaders, 200 friends of 4-H and contest donors and 30 members of the board of director. of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation will participate in planned activities for Roundup-

The leaders add that the annual event is one of the oldest statewide 4-H gatherings in the nation and traces its beginning back to near the turn of the century even before 4-H officially became the youth phase program of the cooperative Extension Service.

The 4-H Club members who come of Roundup have already been named county and district winners in their respective judging and demonstration contests. Only first and second place district winners are eligible to compete in the state contests.

The traditional barbecue will officially open the program on the evening of June 3. The first general assembly will follow with presentation of awards to individuals and business concerns as the highlight. Those to be recognized are strong supporters of 4-H on the district and state levels. The Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation will provide the awards.

On June 4 all previous training and hard work will be put to the test. Winners will be determined in 31 different judging and team and individual demonstration contests. State winners in dairy cattle, livestock and poultry judging will compete for national honors, report the state leaders. Several other state winning teams will be invited to present their demonstrations at state and national meetings-

Omicron Tau Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi met at the Rankin Park Sunday, May 25 at 4:00 p. m. for a May Picnic.



AUSTIN - Game management officers for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department cleared 1,172 violations during April. Fines and costs in the amount of \$24,018.01 were assessed for these violations by Texas courts. Hunting violations totaled 265. There were 382 fishing violations, 336 being for fishing without a license-

There were 62 commercial fishing violations, 212 water safety violations, and two trespassing violations.

Desposition of cases includes: convicted, 923; dismissed, 103; served time in jail, seven; appealed to higher court, 10; fine suspended, seven; money retained by county, 60; not guilty, four; one year probation, two; juvenile, nine; and void, 47.
