Mildred Perkins, a resident of McCamey, has filed the suit in Fort Stockton, Pecos County, in the 112th Judicial District court where it is styled "Mildred Perkins vs. McCamey Hospital, and N. T. Underwood. Et Al", N. T. Underwood was administrator of the McCamey Hospital on May 29, 1967 when the plaintiff says she slipped and fell in the Mc-Camey Hospital, and received severe personal injuries and damage.

On that date, the hospital was still under county operation and the plaintiff has named all county commissioners in the suit. Also named are Pete Ruiz, janitor at the hospital, Underwood Chemical Company of San Angelo and the Hillyard Chemical Company, their agent being listed as the Underwood Chemical company.

In their meeting last Monday, the commissioners court hired John A. Menefee to defend them in the case. Menefee told the News that the first action he would take would be to try to get the suit moved from Pecos County to Upton County "where it should have been filed in the first place," according to Meno



At the meeting about a dozen oil tax men were on hand, along with all members of the school board with one exception, Superintendent H. G. Adams, who explained the proposed budget, W. O. Adams, business manager for the school, school attorney John A. Menefee, three members from the exaluation firm hired by the school and a half-dozen interested specatators.

In a session that lasted to near midnight, the oil tax men questioned the board and superintendent closely on a number of expenditures and pointed out that, with the expected enrollment of about 500 next year, the budget would put the cost close to \$1200 per student to local tax payersamong the highest in Texas, ac-

cording to one of the tax representatives.

Taking the budget item by item, Supt. Adams explained that all but 2% of the increase was due to raises in salaries-almost \$40,000 of which comes about as a result of teacher pay raises approved by the recent session of the Texas Legislature and over which the local board has no control. In setting up the budget, the board anticipated that the teacher pay increase would amount to about \$750 average per teacher and in order to be on the safe side, had used a figure of \$800 per teacher in their estimates.

Among other salary increases proposed is that of the superintendent-from \$15,000 to \$16,529-the business manager-from \$8.989 to \$10,212-all three principals-from \$10,886 to \$12,231. Other salary increases are also included in the (Continued to Back Page)

There are still some booths open and anyone who wishes to operate one is asked to contact Mrs. Sybil Browning. These booths are available without charge.



Summer is Time to **Practice Caution for Poisonous Snakes**

More persons die f rom snake bite in Texas than in any other state of the nation, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Depart-

Every Texan should obtain thorough working knowledge o the correct first aid treatment for snake bite, according to the Department.

In addition, and perhaps just as important, he should learn how to prevent a bite before it can happen.

Steps for making your home less attractive to snakes are simple. chief among them being removal of all rubbish. Rock piles, trash piles, stacked lumber, old tree stumps and other forms of debris near or under houses should be removed.

When a poisonous snake is encountered it is important to do the right thing. To do otherwise is to invite trouble. The best protection is to remain as still as possible until the snake has moved away. It should be remembered that a snake is quick to strike at a moving object, so to quickly step away at such a moment may



Because almost all snake bites are inflicted on the arms or legs of the victim, these limbs require special protection. The use of a little caution when placing hands or feet where snakes may be partially or completely hidden from view is the best protection you can give them.

This is particularly true when climbing hand over hand on a rocky ledge where your hands reach the level of the ledge before

Placing your hands and feet any place which you can't see is asking for trouble because snake. seek seclusion, and having that seculsion intruded upon makes them belligerent.

This is the final "Report from Austin" for the Regular Session of the 61st Legislature. Should we be called back for one or more special sessions, report will be resumed.

Since only a one-year appropriation bill was adopted, we are certain to return sometime within the next 15 months to pass an appropriation bill — and barring several miracles — a tax bill also.

There is much speculation as to the Governor's intentions on a Special Session this summer. Only time will tell.

Many knowledgable observers think that if voters fail to approve annual sessions in the August 5 special election, we will be called back for the express purpose of adopting the remaining year of a two-year appropriation bill with taxes.

Important major matters in the final days included passage of:

The one-year appropriation bill without new tax levies. (Some members called a college building use fee of \$10 per semester



Item number 8 of the petition say "Plaintiff, Mildred Perkins, says and elleges that as a result of the negligence on the part of the Defendants mentioned, and her resulting injuries she has suffered great mental anguish and physical pain and continues to suffer great mental anguish and physical pain, and in all reasonable probability will continue for the rest of her natural life to suffer great mental anguish and physical pain for which the sum of \$100,000 would reasonably and justly compensate her . . . "

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
