st time in a great the county will not now money or obtain an advancement of tax money from the oil companies to tide the county over until the taxes are paid in October of this year.

This does not mean that the county has caught up on its indebtedness, as its fiscal year is from January 1st through December 31 of each year. This is just to show what progress is

being made on our indebtedness.

Our anticipated overdraft at the end of the present year 1969 is expected to be \$78,019.85 in the General Fund, and \$41,921.00 in the Road and Bridge Fund. These expenditures are expected to be incurred in October, November and December of this year.

The budget for 1970 must be

considered a tight budget. This was brought about by two happenings concerning our revenue:

1. The county valuation dropped approximately \$2.5 million, which meant a drop in revenue from taxes of about \$23,750.

2. The fee paid to the office of Tax Collector by the State of Texas for assessing and collecting State Taxes was cut in half, which reduced our revenue from that source by approximately \$13,000.

These two items reduced the county income by approximately \$36,750.

In the way of expenditures, the appropriations were about the same as the budget for the year 1969 for the operations of our many departments. The salaries

will remain the same as no money was budgeted for increases-

Additional money was set up in the amount of \$10,500 to pay one-half of the cost of a new fire truck for the City of McCamey. \$7,250 was approved for new paving in 1970. \$1,350 was approved for a new radar system. This makes a total of \$19,100 set up for new expenditures on the 1970 budget for that one year.

The bonded indebtedness of Upton County as of January 1, 1970 will be \$210,000. This will be retired in the next three years ending with the final payments to be made in 1972. This will relieve the county of payments of approximately \$70,000 a year on our



Park Bonds, Courthouse Bonds, Courthouse Warrants and Park Refunding Bonds. This is all of our bonded indebtedness.

The assessed valuation of all properties in Upton County, based on 20 percent of the actual value in 1968 was \$56,937,286. Our tax rate was 95c and our collections were 98-35 percent of the total in the amount of \$533,650-22. Our valuation for 1969 is expected to be \$54,450,000. The tax rate and percentage value will remain the same, and the expected tax collection will be approximately \$506, 929.50, not including delinquent taxes of approximately \$3,200.

The drop in valuation for the county was due to a decrease in oil productions. Due to a steady but not large drilling program, our production of new oil has been enough to off-set the dwindling production in the older fields and increase our valuation for the past six years. Our valuation increased from \$48,372,000 in 1962 to a high

of \$56,937,286 in 1968 Drilling activity has been very light this past year and could not off-set the general decline in field loss.

This is a problem we can expect to be confronted with in the years to come if new oil is not discovered or if our waterfloods now underway in the county do not prove more successful than water floods north of our fields.

However, due to the strong po-

sition we have on our bonded indebtedness, the financial position of the county is sound and should remain so for many years to come.

And it further appearing to the Commission that it has jurisdiction on its own motion, under the provisions of Article 7880-3c, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of Texas, to set a hearing for designation of an underground water reservoir or subdivision thereof; and thereafter as future conditions may require and factual data justify to alter the boundries thereof.

And it further appearing that due notices, postings and publishings thereof will have to be made in the manner and for the tire provided by Article 7880-15 an 7880-21, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes

#### Commissioners Fix New Voting Boxes

In their meeting on August 11, the Upton County Commissioners' Court, among other actions, established new voting precincts for the county. The new precinct boundries were to take effect ten days after their adoption by the court and will determine all voting hereafter on county-wide issues.

Voting Precinct 1, Box 1 will be in the Courthouse and will constitute all of Commissioner Precinct No. 1.

Voting Precinct No. 2, Box 2, will be at the Rankin Park Building and will constitute all of Commissioner Precinct No. 2.

Voting Precincts 3 and 4, Boxes 3 and 4, will be located in Mc-Camey at the McCamey Park Building and the McCamey School Administration Building, respectively. They, like the Rankin precincts, will be the same as their commissioner precincts.

This change resulted in the elimination of two voting boxes in the county, one in Precinct No. 1, with the box formerly located in Midkiff, and one in Precinct No. 4 in McCamey.

In other matters, the Court approved extension of the Agreement that is currently in effect with the Texas Welfare Department, Commodities Division, which enable the continuation of the Commodities Distribution Center in McCamey where certain low incompresidents may purchase foodst at reduced prices.

At the same meeting were Mr. Bob Edwards and Mr. Bowers of the Farmer's Home Administration, and Mr. N. L. Kiser, engineer and planner for a water and sewer survey in Upton County. The FHA is sponsoring the survey and is a part of their state-wide program on work of this nature.

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## Red Devils Hard at Work in Football Practic Drills


