Commissioners Call for Bids on McC'my Airport Re-Topping

Upton County Commissienrs met in a special session last Wednesday morning. October 1 in Rankin and completed details on the calling for bids for work on the Mc-Camey Airport Contracts are to be let October 20 at a bid opening at 10:00 a.m. in the courthouse in Rankin.

Work to be performed is the appilcation of approximately 58,-000 square yards of asphalt slurry seal to the landing strip. Recent inspections of the strip have indicated that serious damage was occurring due to cracks in the present topping. Without repair, engineers have determined that the landing strip would be a total loss within a short while.

Successful bidders will be required to post performance bond and must pay the prevailing minimum wage rates Specifications for the work are available at the County Judge's office.





A Brief History . . .

The Upton County 4-H Club

The date was 1935. Upton County's first 4-H Club was organized.

Under the capable leadership of the late Casber Snell, County Agent for a number of years, the work progressed in the area of livestock production and range management practices.

The first livestock show was held on a vacant lot across from what is now Mary Lou's Drug on Main Street. Held in March of 1935, there were ten boys showing breeding sheep and fat lambs. The next day, the animals were put in pick-ups and taken to the San Angelo Stock Show.

According to some old records from the club files, the 4-H members paid the going price of 50-cents per night for their hotel rooms and their lambs sold for a whopping 7% cents per pound — contrasted to today's prices of \$1 and upward.

Some of the first 4-H Club boys—no longer boys—are still in the community and many have, or have had, children of their own in the program. Tommy Johnson of McCamey, and Louis Smith of Rankin are among the original 4-Hers who have remained active in their support of club work since its introduction in 1935.

Other early - day Club members included Eugene Holmes, David Workman, Taylor Dameron, Tuffy Barfield, Jiggs Barfield, Elton Hall and Pat Pauley.

Club activities outside the county county were limited to two stock shows, San Angelo and Odessa— contrasted to today's activities that cover all parts of Texas and have reached as far as Chicago.

In the over 30 years that have elapsed since the organization of the Upton County 4-H Club, activities have expanded greatly. The 4-H member of today gets training in leadership, citizenship, entomology, public speaking, livestock judging, horse club work, livestock feeding, and, on occasions, has fielded a state championship gun team.

Today's Upton 4-H Club members make all the major shows in Texas—in style. They travel in a 40' van that houses the members while they are at the show—rooms are no longer 50-cents at hotels—and this same van hauls the show animals—in safety and comfort. In addition to transportation, the van provides cooking facilities, baths and sleeps fourteen people—club members attending the shows, and their sponsoring adults.

The purpose of 4-H Club work today is not only to raise Champion Animals but also to produce a blue ribbon boy or girl. Most club members spend many hours grooming and fitting their animals and they have to accept responsibility which is something that has to be taught to the teenagers of today.

Over the past years, some records of the Upton County 4-H Club members have been outstanding. The program of work has been well supported by the citizens of Upton County and many outstanding adult leaders have served with their time and efforts—putting in long hours and traveling many miles.

In any history of Upton 4-H work, there are some—from the many—who must be listed. Limited space does not permit naming all. Among these are E. G. Branch, Hamp Carter, T. A. Pauley, Walton Harral, Jack Smith, Walton Poage, Alfred Helmers, Jack Garner, Herman Stanley, Sam Howell, Bud Poage, Frank Robbins, Tommy Johnson and Bill Sherrill. There are many more but these people have all given a little extra to the program.

In the past 20 years, the Upton 4-H Club has shown in Chicago, Denver, Ft. Worth, El Paso, Odessa, San Antonio, Abilene, Houston and San, Angelo. Some of the accomplishments of the new generation have been outstanding. They have shown 74 Champions or Reserve Champions and have won all the major shows at least once in Texas plus two champions and reserve at the National Western in Denver. The Upton Club is holder of records that have not been approached by any other club in Texas. An example: they won the El Paso Club Lamb Show for seven consecutive years. They hold an eight-in-a-row win of the Odes


The Upton Club has also had four State Winning teams in other fields of 4-H Club work.

Membership in 4-H is open to any boy or girl between the ages of 9 and 19 who has a desire to do something with their free time.

Most of the ex-4-H members have gone on to make a mark in the work of life, and the leaders in 4-H hope that the small amount of help they give has enabled the boys and girls to lead a richer and fuller life.



Former Rankinite Cited for Valor in Viet Nam Action

A former Rankinite, Sp-4 Tim Harlan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Harlan of Crane, was recently awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious service while on duty in Vietnam July, 1969. Sp.-4 Harlan serves with the Green Berets and is assigned to the 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne). He is nineteen years old and attended Rankin Schools when the family resided in Rankin.

The Bronze Star is awarded for personal bravery and devotion to duty in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service-

Sp-4 Harlan won his citation while under enemy fire. In retaliation for an enemy ambush, Harlan had his platoon fire suppressive fire and attempted to locate the enemy. While searching for the enemy he noticed a teammate moving to assist a wounded soldier. He then moved to assist his teammate with the treatment of three casualties and at the same time called for a medevac-

He noticed that the most critically wounded soldier had stopped breathing and he immediately started giving mouth to mouth resuscitation to the wounded man. When the medivac arrived it could not land close to their position due to the heavy fire, so with the sergeant carrying the man, Sp. 4 Harlan administered mouth to mouth desuscitation across 100 meters of open area under heavy enemy fire.

When he reached the helicopter he immediately turned and went back to help another wounded man to gain the safety of the medivac ship.

Harlan, in a letter to his parents says: "I wish that every boy could come over here and get a taste of different soil—there's a sign in our team house that expresses our feelings "You Haven't Lived Until You've Almost Died."
