School Counselor has Aides for Students

Occupational and educational information is now being made available to the students of Rankin Schools in several forms, according to Melvin Wimberley, school counselor.

A micro-reader lists many occupations, giving such information as history of the trade, methods of entry, outlook, earnings, etc. Cards are also on hand telling something about practically every college in the U. S. and giving the admission requirements.

The occupational briefs in the kit gives much the same material as does the micro-reader and may be used for about the same purposes.

Probably the most unique item is a series of tapes of interviews with people from various fields of work: airline stewardess, architect, medical technician, nurse, machinist, lawyer — to name a few.

Materials are being made available by the West Texas Education Center and are located in Mr. Wimberley's office in the high school building.

They will be on loan here until Wednesday, October 15 and students are encouraged to make use of them.

Rankin Schools Picked in Pilot Health Program Test

The Rankin Independent School District, along with the Andrews District, and a third district as yet undesignated, have been selected to serve as pilot schools in a new health study program to be conducted in Texas Public Schools. Known as the "Optimum School Health Program," the study is backed by the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Medi-

cal Association.

Purpose of the program is to bring together members of the educational and physicians' field, along with selected others, to plan and coordinate a good school health program.

"We believe we have a good health program in Rankin Schools right now," said H. G. Adams, superintendent; "however, we also believe that we need to, and can, do more along these lines."

"Our part as a pilot school will be to test new ideas and plans and see what we can do to make improvements," the superintendent pointed out.

Overall objectives of the program are (1) to increase knowledge of the scope of good school health program, (2) to increase

the awareness of school health problems in Texas and find solutions, (3) to understand and accept as individuals our mutual responsibilities of community and school health team members, and (4) give visibility to the national nutrition survey with emphasis to the Texas survey.

School Board has Regular Session

Rankin School Board, meeting in regular session last Tuesday, attended primarily to routine matters with the exception of approval of a new trial program for the school cafeteria.

Planned to start the later part of October, it will involve only Junior High and High School students. Offered will be meals on a regular cafeteria style in which a student may make selections from several different food items. Instead of the regular 35-cent meal, he might select additional foods that would make the meal cost 40, 50 or 60 cents.

As pointed out, this is to be on a trial basis.

In other matters, the board reviewed an "Athletic Guide", as proposed by Coach George Boal and held it over for further study.

Also reviewed was the football district re-alignment for the next two years.

JUST RESTING—

Earlier in the year—as you will recall—Texas had a pretty good hassle going over school consolidation. The plan was to have only school districts with 1200 or more kids—or, at least county-wide.

The plan fell through when the

citizenry balked and the Texas Legislature cooled the idea.

Since then, several readers have asked me what was currently taking place along these lines. Well, for one thing, I don't believe for a minute that the consolidators have given up on the idea. They are still working and you can bet that they will be back.

As recently as last Monday, an editorial in the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram was boosting an idea put forth by the Governor of Michigan. His proposal:

—Switch the burden of school financing from local communities to the state, substituting a uniform statewide property tax for local school taxes and probably leading to an increase in the state income tax.

—Provide for state funding of teacher salaries, removing the pay issue from the community school boards, and begin experimental incentive programs.

—Halve the number of school districts in the state.

Sound familiar? It should. It's almost word for word the same thing proposed in Texas this year. Apparently the consolidators are working not only in states but on a nationwide basis.

Let's suppose that they are successful and that local school districts are abolished for that, in truth is what they are proposing, that all power be vested in the state. What is the next step That is easy: Federal consolidation and control of public education.

In other words, let's socialize

public education and then, just like our Russian buddies, we could turn 'em out like nice little robots—all trained and thinking only thoughts that are in line with the party theme.

In winding up their editorial the Star-Telegram writers said "Texas had the ball a year ago but had to punt. Now Michigan has the ball. Maybe they'll make more yardage with it than we did."

To which I say the Star-Telegram ought to be put out of the game for unsportsmanlike conduct. All they really want to do is get out from under the responsibility of educating their children in Fort Worth and spread it all over the state.

Nuts.

Hallowe'en, the last day in October, will come on Friday, the 31st and a good supply of candy

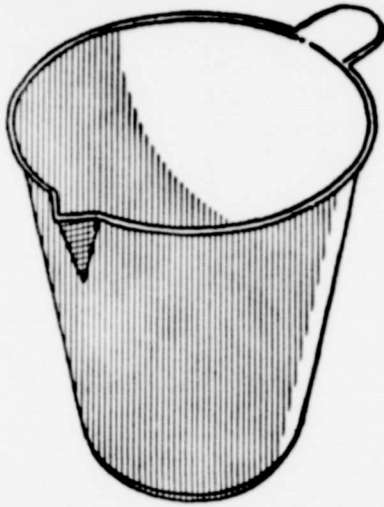

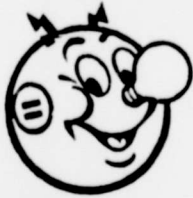

Owls Edge Red Dev

That faint glimmer of hope for a repeat of 1968 when the Devils upset the Big Lake Owls lasted only a short while last Friday night. By the time the first quarter was over, it was obvious to all that the Rankin crew was not up to the task of containing their much larger opponents.

Playing before a full stand of supporters—with a good sprinkling along the fences—the Red Devils made a strong attempt at stopping the Owl offense, something no other team has done thus far in the season.
