Well, considering that we didn't change anything in our district for the next two years, Rankin ought to be a district contender for a few more years. And we still have our good buddies, the Sonora Bronchos in Class A. Now that part is o.k. Sonora may well have had their better days in football-at least for awhile--and sooner or later, we're going to beat them. Up to now it's taken awhile and hasn't been done yet. Next year we open September 5 in Eldorado, get McCamey here on September 12, play Wink on September $25--$ site yet to be de-cided-- get Stanton on October 2 with the site yet to be decided, and draw Sonora here Oct. 9. The district games are in the process of being set up at this writing. This means that we have dropped Coahoma and Big Lake. It may not work that way but that's the way it looks.
However, there's a reason-- and a good one--for dropping Big Lake. That's just too much of a load back-to-back. It's better that we drop our favorites, the Owls, for the time being. Maybe at some later date we can take up where we are leaving off.
Overall, it's a very good nonconference schedule and should put the Red Devils in good shape for their district play. Our winloss record may not be unblemished but we ought to know what good competition looks like--and non-conference games don't count when you get into district play.
