the Weather Bureau. One is a rain gauge that measures rainfall by depth. Another is a rain gauge that measures amounts by weight and automatically records the exact time of day that the rain fell. The third instrument is a temperature recording station and gives the high and low readings for each twenty-four hour period.

According to "Mr. Fred's" records. Rankin has had a total of 17.14 inches of rainfall for 1969up to November 3. Heaviest amounts fell last month when a total of 6.33 inches was recorded.

Hot month for the area-to no one's surprise-was in August when the temperature climbed to 104 degrees on August 16. Interestingly, on that same date Mc-Camey had a reading of 108 de-

"McCamey is always three or four degrees warmer than Rankin," Mr. Welling pointed out.

And, although many Rankinites, like "Mr. Fred", have been keeping track of Rankin weather in their own way-and rainfall may vary considerably even from one end of the street to the other-Mr. Fred's readings are the ones that go in the record books-

HOT STUFF-

As noted on Page 1 of this issue, Mr. Fred Welling is Rankin's official weather man and has been for almost a quarter of a century. Now the job doesn't pay anything but the hours are good and for his troubles he learns a good bit about things that most of us never realize.

For instance, did you know that last August-you remember last August, that was the month the ice cubes in the refrigerator all got sun tans-Rankin was much nicer and cooler than McCamey?

That's right. In an official report put out by the U. S. Department of Commerce, a copy of which is sent to Mr. Fred, Rankin is listed as having an average daytime temperature last August of only 95.8 while the flatlanders over in McCamey had a scorching 98.2 average. Not only that but it was much nicer in the Rankin high country at night last August with an average 70.6 while the Brethern to the southwest had

to take their lumps at 73.3 degrees.

It will be noted that scientific studies have determined that the ideal temperature for man to do his best work and feel the most comfortable is said to be 70 degrees. True, Rankin was .6 off the mark last August-at night-but we're working on it-

Another item that might be noted is the fact that Rankin is situated up among the peaks at 2,595 feet altitude while McCamey-out in the flatlands-is only 2.441 feet. And, as would be expected in a low, swampy part of land, the rainfall for 'Camey was 2.57 inches during August while Rankin received 1.73 inches. Gad, it must have been miserable down there in all that heat and humidity. But then we can't all live in Rankin-



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

NOVEMBER GARDEN CALENDAR

 Review your home landscape plan and determine your plant needs. If the plant you want or need is not in stock, ask them to order it for you.

 Check the compost pile. Those leaves and lawn rakings will not compost without moisture. Turn or mix contents with a shovel or fork to hasten decomposition.

 Prepare beds for roses to be planted in December and January. Place your orders for those special varities now for delivery in December or January.

 Clean up, sharpen and oil the garden tools for winter storage. Have power tools overhauled or repaired before storing so they will be ready for use when needed.

Force spring flowering bulbs for indoor flowering.

 Finish planting all spring flowering bulbs except tulips. Hold tulips until December except in North Texas.

 Set out pansy plants, sweet peas, calendullas.

CALENDAR

 Review your home landscape plan and determine your plant needs. If the plant you want or need is not in stock, ask them to order it for you.

2. Check the compost pile. Those leaves and lawn rakings will not compost without moisture. Turn or mix contents with a shovel or fork to hasten decomposition-

3. Prepare beds for roses to be planted in December and January. Place your orders for those special varities now for delivery in December or January.

4. Clean up, sharpen and oil the garden tools for winter storage. Have power tools overhauled or repaired before storing so they. will be ready for use when need-

5. Force spring flowering bulbs for indoor flowering.

6. Finish planting all spring flowering bulbs except tulips. Hold tulips until December except in North Texas-

7. Set out pansy plants, sweet peas, calendullas.

8. In area such as ours where rains have been scarce or lacking be sure to water evergreen trees and shrubs both broad leaf and narrow leaf types. This is especially true of mellias.

9. Remove leaves that fallen or blown prevent them the grass.

10. Dig and after the first the foliage.

11. Clean annual and beds. Rework beds and for spring planting. Debr moved from beds should b ed or hauled away to red danger of insect and diseas lems next season.

12. Take cuttings of your ite houseplants and grow placements for those that become overgrown or are condition.
