If, for a special dish, you do peel first, peel thin just before you use them. If you must peel ahead of time, put the pared sweetpotatoes in salted water to keep them from darkening.
Always cook sweetpotatoes as quickly as possible and serve them piping hot so there is little chance for the air to rob their good store of vitamin C ,
