Now also, back in the fall of '68, I paid out 20 bucks to have

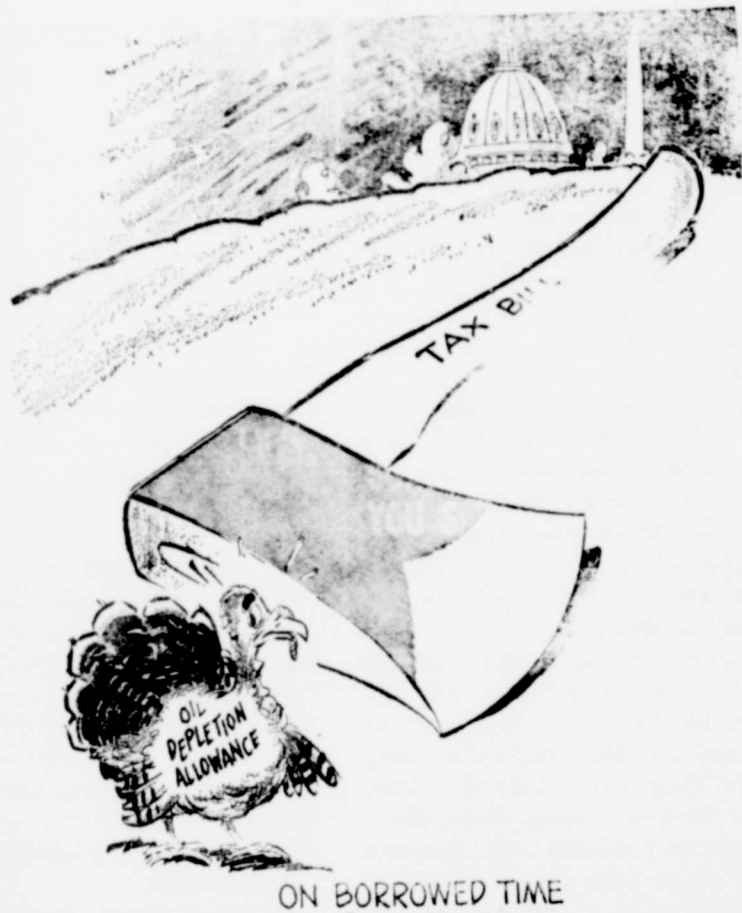

# HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

## NATIVE AMERICAN SWEETPOTATOES

Columbus found the sweetpotato growing here and took it back to Europe as proof of the wonders of the New World.

Early settlers in the South soon made it one of their favorite foods. Today we know the sweetpotato as a prize package of food values. It's a rich source of Vitamin A and also provides worthwhile quantities of Vitamin C and small amounts of the B vitamins and minerals.

Most recipes for sweetpotatoes call for them to be cooked first in their jackets. The thin skin of the cooked sweetpotato is easy to remove and takes with it less of the goodness underneath. Too, when the protective brown jacket is gone, some sweetness is dissolved in the cooking water.

If, for a special dish, you do peel first, peel thin just before you use them. If you must peel ahead of time, put the pared sweetpotatoes in salted water to keep them from darkening.

Always cook sweetpotatoes as quickly as possible and serve them piping hot so there is little chance for the air to rob their good store of vitamin C.

Supplies of sweetpotatoes are plentiful this month.

- 4 medium sweetpotatoes, peeled and cut in 1/2 cup canned whole cranberry sauce
  - 3 tablespoons lemon juice
  - 1/2 cup light corn syrup
  - 1 tablespoon melted butter and margarine

Place sweetpotatoes in a shallow baking pan, add cranberry sauce and mix well. Spread mixture over sweetpotatoes. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes, basting occasionally with mixture.

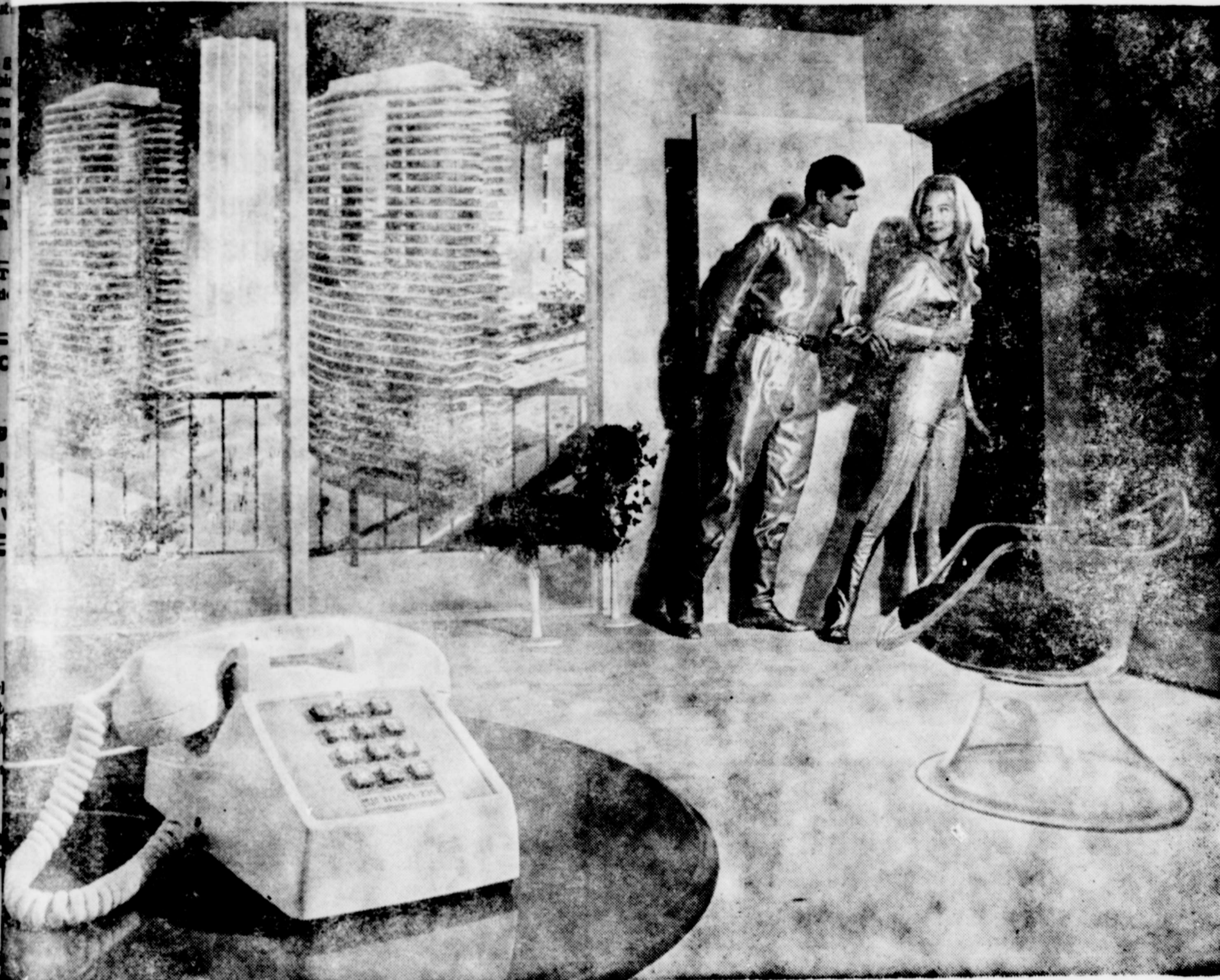

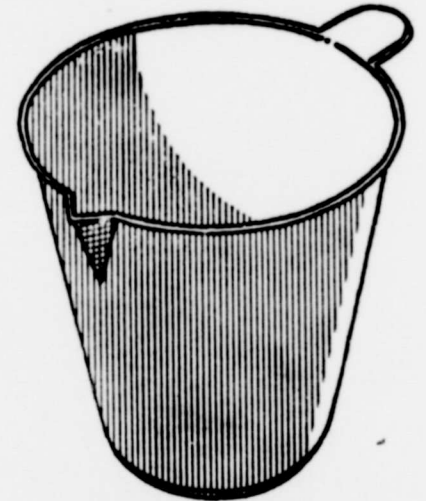
