## Rankin School Trustees --

### Numerous items covered by board

Regular meeting held Monday night, the Rankin School District's Board of Trustees met to a number of items. The meeting was the official opening of the Christmas holidays. The board approved the writing-off of delinquent tax accounts considered to be uncollectible. Total amount of the delinquency was less than \$500 and included such items as oil and gas taxes. The board also discussed the matter of the five home plays for the past season. It was revealed that \$5,746.63 was received. This was approximately the same amount as received last year. They also discussed the matter of the football tournament that will be held this year and a motion picture to be shown next year. The board also discussed the matter of a textbook committee to be formed to determine what books should be used in next year's class. The board is also in the process of looking over the books now in use in the school and making a study of several other books of school activity.

### RHS graduate is picked for honors

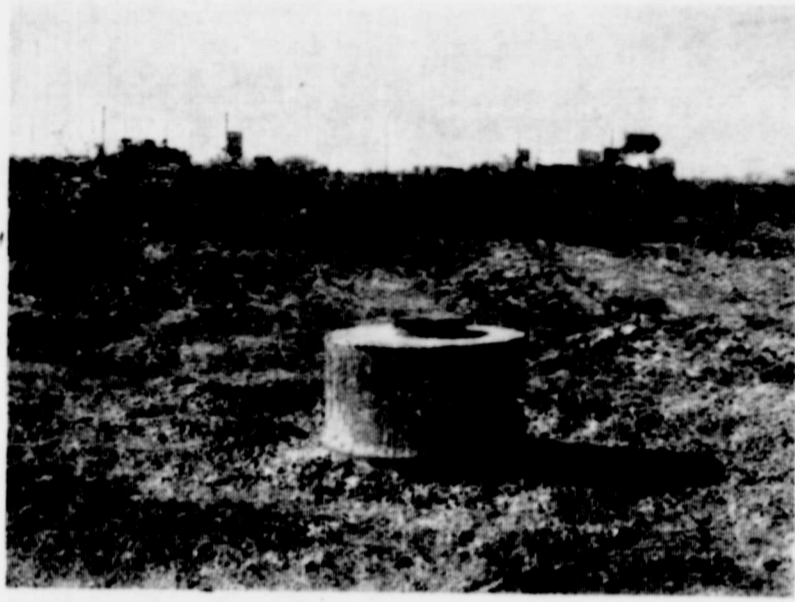


PAT DISHMAN

### Voter registration slow as new year arrives

Although next year is a big one—an election year—less than 100 voter registration certificates have been issued to date, according to the office of H. E. "Gene" Eckols, tax assessor-collector. The 1970 voter certificates have been available to the public at both the courthouse and the McCamey sub-station since last October 1.

Final deadline for securing the right-to-vote slips is January 31,

1970. They are issued without charge to legally qualified residents of the county.

In addition to the usual city council, school board and hospital board elections upcoming in 1970, voters will fill half the county offices, some district offices and the usual batch of state positions. In addition, proposed constitutional amendments will also be voted on — plus any special elections (Continued to Page 7)

### Holiday schedule for 1970 fixed by court

Regular session, held December 8, the Upton County Commissioners Court, after action taken, adopted the following schedule of holidays for 1970. Offices will be closed on the following dates. Among them are: Christmas, Thursday and Friday, December 24 and 25; New Year's Day, Friday, January 1 and 2; Martin Luther King Day, Monday, January 13; Presidents' Day, Wednesday, February 11; Good Friday, Thursday and Friday, March 26 and 27; Easter, Thursday and Friday, March 24 and 25; Mother's Day, Friday, May 8; Memorial Day, Monday, May 19; Independence Day, Thursday, July 2; Labor Day, Monday, September 7; Veterans Day, Wednesday, November 11; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday, November 26 and 27; Christmas, Thursday and Friday, December 24 and 25. New Year's, 1971, Friday, Jan-

uary 1.

Among other actions taken by the Court at the Monday session was the awarding of a bid to Stockton Ford, Inc. of Ft. Stockton in the amount of \$2134.25 for a 1970 Custom 500 Ford. The auto purchase included a trade in of a 1967 Chevrolet for which the seller allowed the county \$1700.

In another matter, the Court signed an agreement with the Texas Highway Department concerning announced work on a county Ranch to Market Road between Rankin and McCamey. In the agreement, the county agreed to furnish all required right of way, cleared of obstructions and free of costs to the state.

## COUNTY AGENT'S KORNER



### New Soil Tests Available —

If your plants this past summer seemed to wilt during the daytime and revive at night, the chances are you had a nematode infection in the root system. That is, if watering had been adequate and other things equal.

Nematodes form root like nodules or root knots on the root system of the plants. They are particularly bad on tomatoes and ornamental plants.

Texas A & M University now has a laboratory that will detect the Nematode infection in the soil. This lab went into effect on December 1. The cost of the sample testing is \$2.00 each.

There are fumigants that can be used to control nematode infection in the soil, but the first thing that must be determined is to what extent nematode numbers are in the soil.

An information sheet has to be filled out and soil sample bags may be picked up at my office. Also instructions on how to take the sample will be given at the same time.

This should be done in the spring when soil temperature is not less than 50 degrees.

For further information, contact my office for submitting samples for Nematode detection.

**Former Uptonite,  
family dead in  
private plane crash**

A plane crash near Bellevue in  
Clay County November 27 took  
the lives of five members of the  
J. R. Senter family. Senter was a  
former resident of Upton County.  
He attended school in McCamey  
and later lived in Rankin where  
he served one year as tax assess-  
or-collector for Rankin Schools.  
He and his father, F. O. Senter,  
now of El Paso, also operated a

Killed with Senter, who was 48,  
were his wife Norma, 46, and
