
# **Voter registration slow** as new year arrives

Although next year is a big onean election year-less than 100 voter registration certificates have been issued to date, according to the office of H. E. "Gene" Eckols, tax assessor-collector. The 1970 voter certificates have been available to the public at both the courthouse and the McCamey sub-station since last October 1. Final deadline for securing the

right-to-vote slips is January 31,

1970. They are issued without charge to legally qualified residents of the county.



If your plants this past summer seemed to wilt during the daytime and revive at night, the chances are you had a nematode infection in the root system. That is, if watering had been adequate and other things equal.

Nematodes form root like nodules or root knots on the root system of the plants. They are particularly bad on tomatoes and ornamental plants.
