"Gene" Eckols this week announced that a new procedure will go into effect the latter part of December that will radically effect the manner in which one is to go about securing their 1970 vehicle license plates.

Beginning December 29, 1969, the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division in Austin will begin mailing to Texas vehicle owners a "License Plate Renewal Application." This application will come directly to the vehicle owner.

"Don't throw it away," cautions Eckols.

This application will be the only "papers" needed to register a vehicle next year. Owners should take the application to Eckol's office, either at the courthouse in Rankin or the sub-station in McCamey. They may then purchase their 1970 tags-

The new plates will go on sale February 1, 1970.

"Again we want to emphasize the importance of keeping this application that you will get from Austin," Eckols said. "It will be of prime importance when you get ready to register your car or truck in 1970."

Vehicle owners who have the "personalized" plates for which they pay an added fee, can also expect to get a notification in the same manner, according to the tax assessor.


All letters are printed as nearly as possible in the wording and spelling used by the young writers since that's the kind Santa reads best.



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



night crawling under the barbed wire on our perimeter. He was carrying three satchel charges, apparently to be used to blow up aircraft on our flight line A civilian KP at an aviation company in Chu Lai put a satchel charge behind a rack of mess trays. When a tray was pulled out the charge exploded.

I mention these things to further illustrate that no Vietnamese can be trusted; to show why many soldiers return home thoroughly disgusted with Viet Nam and everything and everyone connected with it; to show why GI's resent risking their lives to protect someone that may be shooting at them tomorrow.

It isn't hard to see that I am biased, but the facts are here! How you use these facts is up to you. I ask only that you read the story and decide for yourself whether or not to reprint it. Since enlisted men under the rank of sargeant are no longer authorized to publicly comment on the war I ask that you do not use my name in print.

HOW COULD A MASSACRE HAPPEN?

To try to understand the alleged massacre · · . it is necessary also to understand the atmosphere of a war which has led many U. S. fighting men to feel they are as much at war against Vietnam as for it-

While the communiques speak of battles involving companies and battalions . . . each GI carries with him the certain knowledge that in any village there may be men, women, and even children who are also the enemy, awaiting the time and place to attack

Brutality, and indifference to human life, are commonplace in Vietnam. Even the disfigurement of dead GI's is common.

In Vietnam the killing of civilians was a practice established by the Viet Cong as a major part of the war long before the first U.S. ground troops were committed in March 1965.

By official count, more than 20,000 civilians had been murdered by that time in enemy executions aimed at so thoroughly terrorizing the countryside that none would resist. The total now is more than 3,000 killed by the enemy in Hue when they held a part of that city for 21/2 weeks. At Hue, the victims were predominately civilians of all ages. Many were killed simply by tying their hands behind their backs shoving them into a trench and burying them alive-

It was into this conflict that the American troops were plunged-They had been told to kill the Viet Cong who were bad and woo the peasant who only aided the enemy because he had no choice. Given a chance, the official line went. Vietnam wanted to be free and democratic just like America.

But the GIs found a war of sundered families, and divided allegiances to any regime, either Viet Cong or Siagon-

The infantry came to know that the farmer, who might be a friend by day, could become a guerrilla by night who killed just as sure-

ly and just as ruthlessly as the enemy's professional troops . . .

In short, the GIs felt-and still do-there were few they could

There is no front in Vietnam, no rear, no safety. To the GI of a rifle company everyone outside the perimeter can be suspected of plotting to kill him. In Vietnam the word civilian does not describe noncombatants. It describes dress more certainly than occupation.

In Vietnam the GI has plenty of reason for his distrust and

Item: An elderly woman noted for her ready smile and broken betel nut-stained teeth, was caught smuggling out a detailed map of the defenses of an American base where she worked as a laundrywoman.

Item: U. S. Marines found begging children to whom they had been giving food were stealing grenades that were tossed back at the Leathernecks during the

Item: One Green Beret commander found his desk boobytrapped by one of the Vietnamese working for him . . .

Item: After one night attack by a large enemy force. Americans sweeping the perimeter found the

body of the camp's barber, still clutching a rifle . . .

Item: A U. S. truck was blown up . . . GIs from another truck quickly traced out the electrical wires to the detonator and found a young girl still holding the handle. They shot her.

The Pentagon says that today's soldiers are the most sophisticated in history. But more than being able to operate intricate electronic equipment and the like, the GIs in Vietnam also could see at first hand the corrpution, the indifference of Vietnamese soldiers to winning the war, contrast between the poverty in the countryside and the comparative wealth of the cities and the way Vietnamese merchants, bar girls and even children selling black market American soft drinks gouged them. Added to this were the deaths and maining of friends. Cynicism mixed with anger rapidly replaced the early idealism among combat troops-

No spark sets off a fire unless it falls into combustible material-The sparks that ignite American GIs are snipers, mines and booby traps. The major cause of casualties in Vietnam are mines and booby traps. Snipers also are a

major factor. The three are all the more hated because each is hidden and after the damage is done, there usually is no chance for the American infantrymen to even the score because no enemy can be found.

Often intelligence will pinpoint a village as the source of the mine and booby trap makers and snipers. Repeated sweeps through the hamlet turn up little or nothing except more casualties. And hatred builds up for the villagers who know the snipers and know where the hidden traps are but don't tell. Then one day something snaps in one or more men. The frustration and fear drives them across the line of civilized conduct that in combat zones is a hazy mark at best.

There are indications that these things might have been at work on the men who are accused of massacre in My Lai last year.

They certainly were on a group of American Marines I accompanied into a village south of Da Nang in 1965. A half squad, out of a regimental size force, went on a brief rampage killing a group hiding in a civilian air raid shel-

The battalion was due to rotate home in four weeks. In the previous month, 15 per cent of the battalion had been killed or wounded by snipers and booby traps. None of the Marines had seen a Viet Cong soldier during the time-

After the reports of the incident were published in the United States, Maj. Gen. Lewis Walt, then U.S. Marine commander in Viet-

nam, issued a public statement saying the killings "grieve me deeply. And I express my deep sympathy to the loved ones of such innocent victims as I do the loved ones of the Marines who have given their lives.

The U.S. Command's position has been from the beginning that civilians are not to be harmed.

Mrs. Ann Kelley won the door prizeBut the case for the sanctity of civilian life is weakened by the knowledge that there are South Vietnamese assassination teamssometimes led by Americans-operating in the countryside killing enemy officials, as opposed to soldiers, often in their beds at home, Viet Cong style. And GIs who have searched out a village after American bombers have done their work cannot help but be a bit cynical about orders not to molest civilians.

A senior officer in the legal field was asked after a series of murder trials earlier this year what he thought had motivated the Americans involved, all found guilty.

He said nearly all the cases he had handled involved villagers in Viet Cong held areas. When the pressure of fear or hate or some combination of these factors hit the men hard enough, they broke down with a sort of combat fatigue that ended with slayings.

"If these men never had come to Vietnam, they probably would have lived out their lives as useful citizens and with a police record no more serious than a speed ing ticket or two," the officer said.

In some cases the same men have had to stand trial for killing civilians have helped support Vietnamese orphanages or become involved in unofficial relief operations for families made refugees by the war.

"In war, everything is realer than real. The capacity for great violence rises to the surface, but so does the capacity for great compassion," an Army doctor said "Remember, part of the brutalizing men undergo is necessary to their psychological survival. You can't look war in the face with the kind of emotional response we use in the States-You would go mad."
