# Free measles vaccine to be offered Jan. 22

In cooperation with the State Health Department the Rankin School Board has approved a plan for free vaccination of students in Grades 1-5 for Rubella (German Measles). This undertaking will be on Thursday, January 22 and is to be administered by Dr. J. D. Gossett and school nurse, Mrs-Stella Hughes at the Elementary School, All school students will be vaccinated in the morning.

In the afternoon, all pre-school age children will be accepted. The pre-schoolers will be charged a fee of \$2.

State health officials are anticipating an outbreak of the German Measles and are urging all who can to take the shots. However, no student will be vaccinated without prior written approval of his perents.


