Announcement was made this week by Leon Feuge, administrator of Rankin Hospital, that the board of Directors, in their last meeting, had appointed C. G. Taylor to fill the vacated board seat of Joe Simpson. Simpson, president of the Board, recently moved from Rankin.

Taylor will hold the seat until next April's elections at which time he will have to seek an elective term if he wishes to continue to serve. Presently in the Sales Tax Department for the State of Texas, "Grim" served a number of years previously on the Hospital Board.

Replacing Simpson as president of the Board is Horace West, the former vice-president. Moving into the vice-president's position is Jerry Barton. Dell Cooledge, secretary, rounds out the executive posts on the Board of Directors.

"I have tried to carry out the duties of my office as Justice of the Peace with fairness and equal treatment to one and all," he said.

## Free measles vaccine to be offered Jan. 22

In cooperation with the State Health Department the Rankin School Board has approved a plan for free vaccination of students in Grades 1-5 for Rubella (German Measles). This undertaking will be on Thursday, January 22 and is to be administered by Dr. J. D. Gossett and school nurse, Mrs. Stella Hughes at the Elementary School. All school students will be vaccinated in the morning.

In the afternoon, all pre-school age children will be accepted. The pre-schoolers will be charged a fee of \$2.

State health officials are anticipating an outbreak of the German Measles and are urging all who can to take the shots. However, no student will be vaccinated without prior written approval of his parents.

She has been a good and patient teacher and I feel fully qualified in all aspects to serve."

But I think we're going to have to call Spiro back and let him give these same folk another little talking to—this time on their slanted sports reporting.

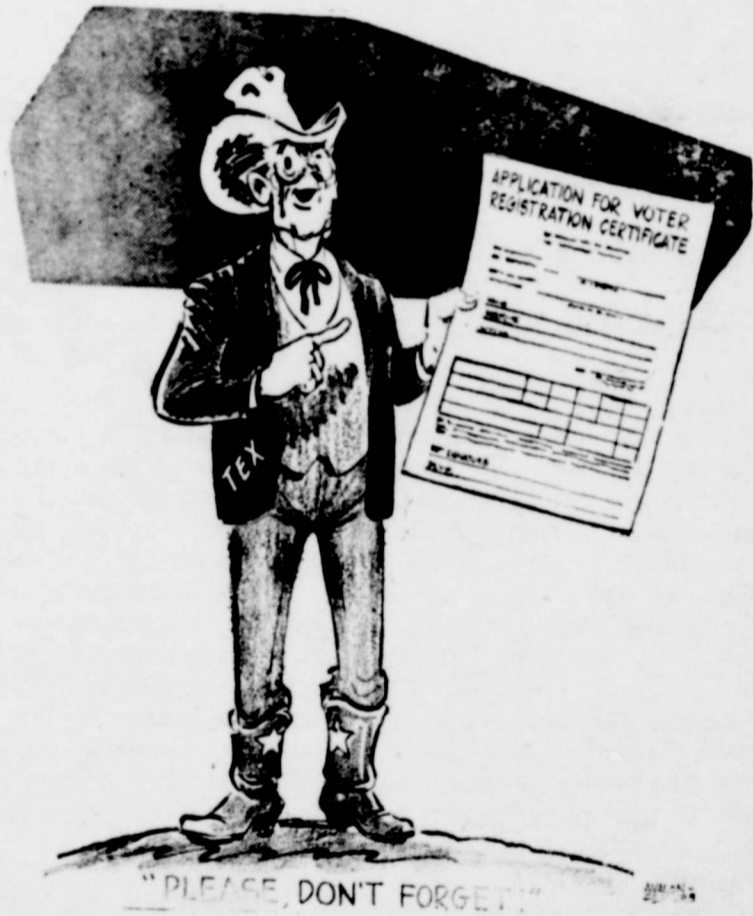
For years the American public has been fed on the idea that only the New York Yankees were great in baseball and that the NFL had all the football players and the brains in the coaching staff.
