Follow all label directions and safety precautions. The manufacturer is required by law to properly label his material. The label clearly states what the peesticide is to be used for and how

Also precautions for the applicator's safety when applying the material are listed.
All agricultural chemicals, especially pesticides should be stored under lock and key and in their original containers. If for any reason, the original container
