failure to register a proper license with the County and District Clerk of Upton County, has refused to give any information to local authorities. It is not known whether or not he has a family, however, it is reported that he gave his age as 31 and place of birth as Memphis, Tenn.
Charges were officially filed by County Attorney John A. Menefee before County Judge Allen Moore late Tuesday afteernoon. Judge Moore set bail at $\$ 3,500$ and the defendant, unable to raise that amount, was confined to the county jail.
Menefee said the offense carried a penalty of $\$ 50$ to $\$ 500$ in fines plus 30 days in the county
jail with each day that the offense was alledged to have occurred to be counted as a seperate offense.
The man held in jail began his work at the McCamey Hospital on or about July 6.

The following editorial appeared on the front page of last week's McCamey News. It
sez:

Evidently the factual report in a recent issue of the MeCamey News of the McCamey Hospital budget hearing held last June 30 motivated the passing of several petitions through the community along with the misrepresentation of many facts in the case.
Since the meeting had to do with next year's budget and the levying of taxes, it was probably the most important meeting of the year for the Hospital Board
and the tax payers of the hospital district. This newspaper had every right to have a representative at that meeting. In fact, it was our duty to the people of the hospital district to be there and report the happenings of the meeting. We only printed it and it was accurate. Had it not been accurate we would have been faced with a libel suit in short order.
Had we failed to print all the pertinent happenings that took place in that meeting we would have been guilty of not keeping the trust of all the people of the community.
It would seem that the policy of our present Hospital Board and its administrator has been that its administrator has been that
of giving the people only that information which they want them to know and withholding that which might cause the people to frown upon their official actions. This policy is the sole reason for the violent reaction on the part of some of the members of th Board and its Administrator the accurate news article which evidently gave the people more information than they wished them to know.
We talked several times last fall with the Hospital Administrator regarding the publication of a guarantee to Dr. Lucas. We informed Mr. Collins (the administrator) that most of the people of the community had heard the rumor of a guaranteed income, but that in many cases the amount was being highly exaggerated We urged him, in order to put a stop to these rumors which would only grow and result in controversy as time went on, to publish the facts. On three different occasions Mr. Collins agreed to submit the information for publication. To this date we have received no such information from the Admiristrator. Of course, as we recall, Mr. Collins did not give any specific date on which he would give us this data.

This newspaper supports two or more doctors in MeCamey. We are 100 percent for Dr. Lucas and have been so from the beginning. We believe our town is most fortunate in having the Doctor and his fine family living amongst us.

WE ARE OPPOSED to our Hospital Board and its Administrator withholding information regarding the spending of public money regardless of what it is being spent for. The McCamey Hospital is not a private corporation as some of the actions of the Administrator and some of
the members of the Board would as to all expenditures of public lead you to believe. Our hospital is tax supported public property and the people of the hospital district have every right to ask for and receive a full disclosure funds.
The News firmly believes that any tax supported body should make full disclosure to the people they represent."
