Plants with diseased or damaged root systems can't absorb enough water and nutrients under summer drought conditions to furnish all plant parts. When this happens, tips of branches die back and leaf tips are scorched On some plant types, leaf shed ding follows.

A large number of plant specimen have been received in the Plant Disease Diagnostic Labora tory at Texas A\&M University this summer with many of them having been damaged by plant pathogenic organisms. Very often however, other factors were involved which are often difficult to identify
Some conditions may be simply due to drought stress, but others may be due to excess use of commercial fertilizers, improper usof herbicides, natural pas leaks which replace the oxygen in the soil and other factors.
