rent enrollment includes a Kindergarten class, a group of students who would nor have been counted until next year under the previous arrangements. This first Kindergarten totaled 23 students, the number representing the almost exact figure of decline in the first grade in elementary,
"This is one of our smallest 1st Grades in many years," said H . G. Adams in remarking on the 23 youngesters in that grade. Oddly enough, these 23 students-like the 23 in Kindergarten-are beginning their first year in school. The 1st Grade of 1970 will represent the last "beginning" class for the Rankin System with the Kindergarten taking over that distenction in the future

Enrollment by schools included 133 in elementary, 185 in junior high, 155 in high school and the 23 in Kindergarten.

Numbers by classes break down as follows: 1st Grade, 23; 2nd Grade, 40; 3rd Grade, 30; 4th Grade, 40; 5th Grade 42; 6th Grade 41;

7h Grade, 44; 8th Grade. 58;
th Grade, 46; 10th Grade, 41; 11th Grade 30; and 12th Grade. 38.

As a rule, shortly after the pening of a new school term. enrollment changes-sometimes up and sometimes down-as families completed their summer vacations and job realignments are established.

Number Five: Set the example.
