## Red Devils to Open 1970 Season Friday With Eldorado Encounter

When the Rankin Red Devils open their 1970 football season Friday night in Eldorado, they will face an old and honored foe in the Eagles.

## Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.

Rankin and Eldorado first met in the current eleven-man series in 1955 when Rankin hustled past the Eagles 27-7. Since that date they have played a total of thirteen games with Rankin winning five and Eldorado, eight. However, pointwise, the contest is almost at a draw with Rankin having scored a total of 193 points to 197 for Eldorado.
The two teams have generally met in non-conference play, but have, at times, also been in the same district. No matches between the two have been held since 1967 when Rankin moved
to their new district.
Most of the games between the Red Devils and the Eagles have been closly contested and on only two occasions has a team scored over thirty points. There have been three shut-outs, one administered to Rankin by Eldorado in 1959, and the other two handed to the Eagles by the Red Devils in their last two meetings.
