AJRA is a non-profit organization whose membership is open to youthful rodeo participants one to nineteen. Its membership covers the states of New Mexico and Oklahoma. The area also sponsoring a number of rodeos yearly.

AJRA members are paid yearly salaries and are secretary-managers and are elected by August 31 each year.

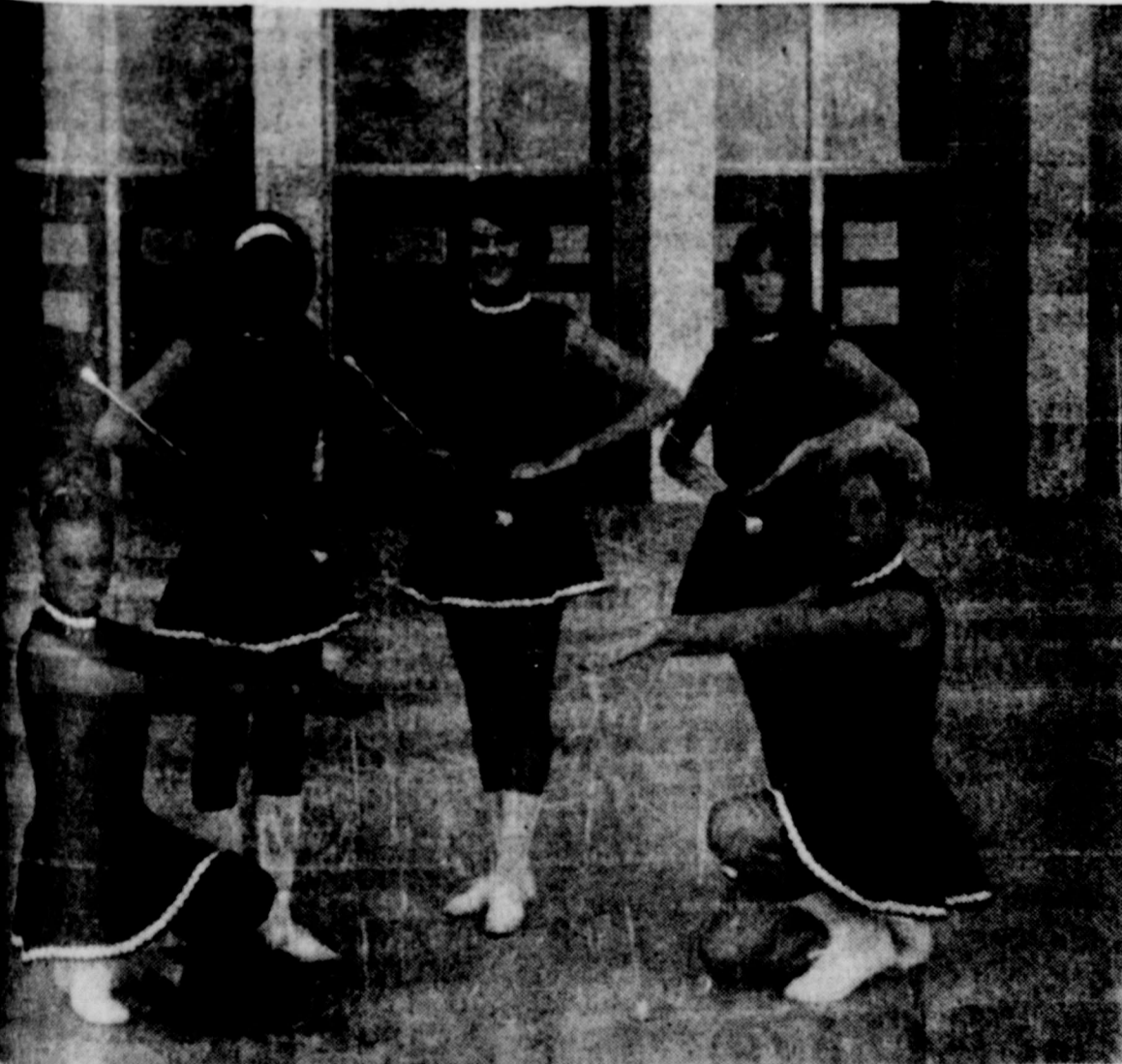

contrast as we have methods, it should not before we can tell.

can mark it down—there'll be a bigger crowd from Rankin than there will be from Clint. Last Friday down here at the Red Devil-Socorro game, I don't believe Socorro had a single fan in their stands. There were three or four men over there but I suspect they were bus drivers — or they may have been real, live fans.

And the Rankin stands? Practically full, naturally, rain and all. It's doubtful that the Clint visitor's stands will be large enough to hold everyone. Oh, yes—sir—all the Red Devil followers are going out there just to see the ball game. Take in a few of the side attractions while they're out there? Well, maybe—but just a few, you understand.

This has been mentioned several times in this column but it's always interesting and enlightening perhaps for our newcomers. Draw a circle on a map, using Rankin as the center and Clint as the outside edge. This circle will show that we could play football teams anywhere east of Ruidosa, New Mexico, south of Amarillo, west of Fort Worth, below San Antonio and north of Laredo and

be as close or closer than we are to Clint. In fact, we could play in Altus, Oklahoma—or anywhere in two-thirds of Texas and still not have any further to go.

Amazing? No. Merely foolish. This situation has been protested vigorously more than once by several of the school superintendents in District 6-A, Rankin's included; but the state people in charge say that's the way it is to be. Which shows a thing or two: one, local schools have very little say over a lot of things in the education system, and two, the state planners don't give a hoot about how tax money is spent—just as long as their little plans on paper work out.

It will cost Rankin Schools between \$1,000 and \$1,500 to make this one ball game—depending on how much wear and tear you want to count on the equipment. With money getting tight and the tax bite ever getting bigger, it would seem that there ought to be some way to scotch a thing like this.

If fans want a week-end in El Paso, I'm sure they could work out an excuse without the school district having to lay out a big hunk of money.

But then I'm a sorehead as everyone knows.

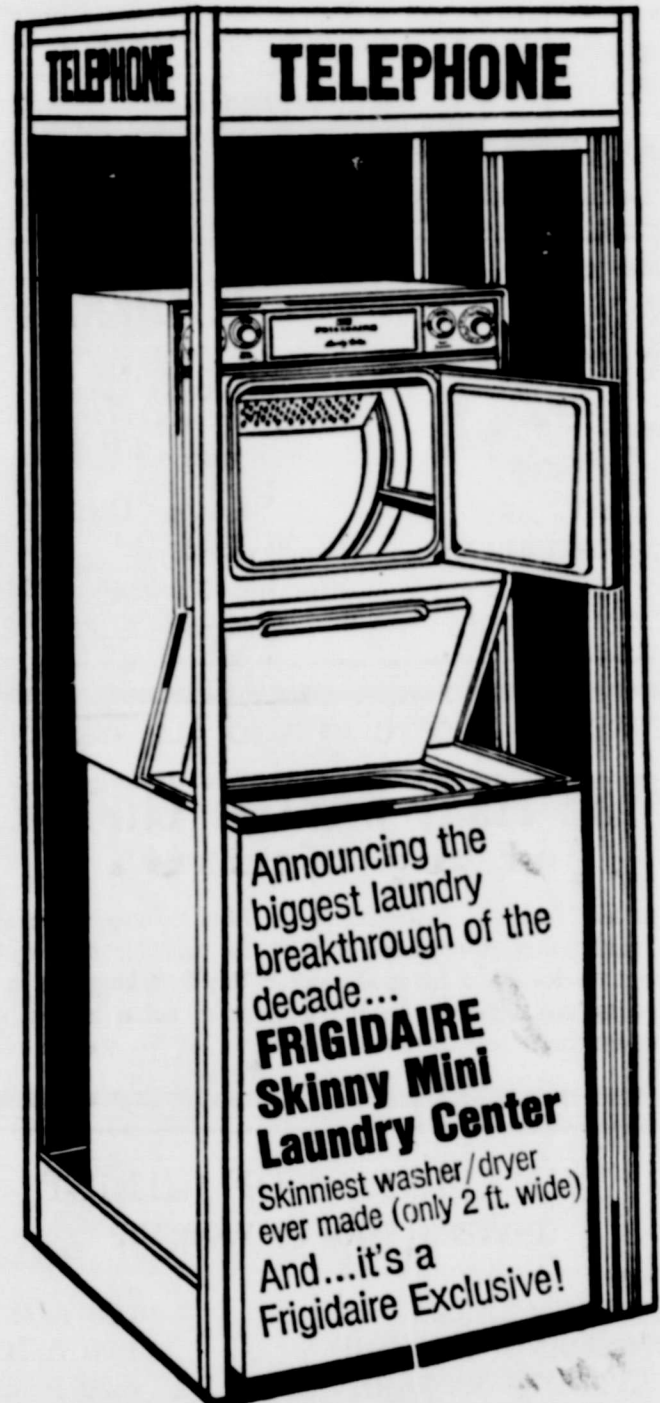

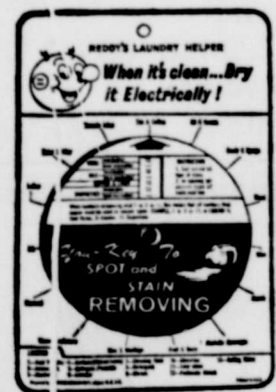
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Karen Bainst Hosts Omicron Tau Meet

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The County Clerk must work under orders of the District and County Judges, the District Attorney's office, the Supreme Court and Criminal Court of Appeals of the state, State Examiner's and Inspector's office, State Tax Commission, the State Judicial Committee, Sheriff's office, Attorneys and general public.

The County Clerk must be able to use a typewriter, adding machine Xerox machine and other office equipment. She must be able to account for large sums of money that are received and distributed by the office. All books, records and files must be kept up-to-date and all money received must be properly accounted for.

Getting elected does not guarantee anyone that he will have a job for the next four years. He may be removed from office by the court orders for failing, refusing, neglecting or inability to perform the duties as prescribed by statutes. The County Clerk is subject to investigation by a Grand Jury or by complaint of anyone having knowledge and proof of any criminal violation pertaining to such office.

She must know when to prepare the Jury list, where to get this list, how to prepare it and who is required to assist in preparing the list, who shall carry a key to the list, when to draw a jury for jury court, how to prepare venires for the jury, when to mail the venires, how to draw a jury for a jury trial, how to keep track of the jury in Court proceedings, how to make Motion dockets and Jury dockets for the Judges and Attorneys, when to make them and how many days before court convenes that the dockets must be mailed, how to fill out all kinds of legal papers such as: Venires, Subpoenas, Notices, Applications, Appearance Bonds, Stay Bonds, Recognition

Bonds, and many others, how to approve and the requirements for surety before proving bonds, what legal instruments be filed, recorded and issued, the charges for the services in all kinds of court cases, other proceedings, such as: Mechanical Materialman's Liens, Tax Liens, Notary Traffic cases, Misdemeanor cases, cases, Juvenile, Adoptions, Probate, Declaration of Death, Foreign fees, Judgment Quit title, Damages, Divorces, Child cases and payments.

All of this is in different Dockets and different procedure of handling and cost for each type of suit or instrument.

If one is to do a good job, she must be cooperative, have a sound judgment, efficient, smile and go ahead when you have to throw up your hands and quit. It takes a lot of stickability, along with all the other things to keep the County's financial books in "the black" and able to pay all bills by the end of the fiscal year.

When I go to the polls to vote, I want to see a person who is honest, efficient and capable of doing the task set before them. When they take office there are rules and regulations that must abide by; therefore an officer's job is not to be loaded down with many things that help make into law.
