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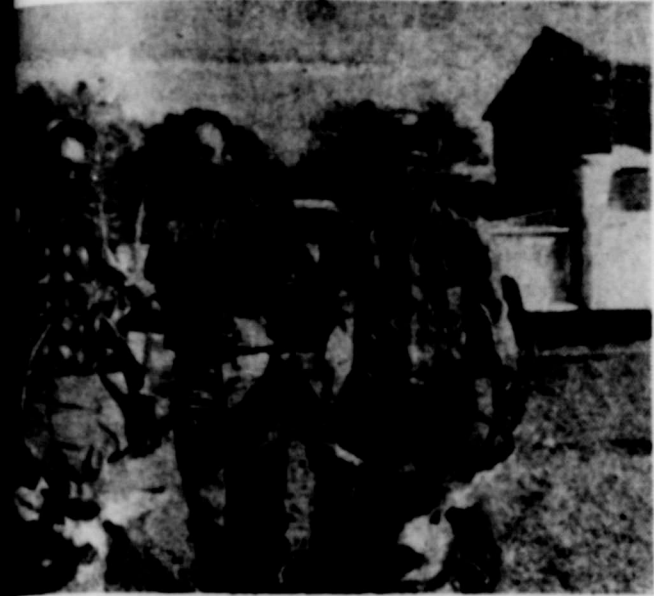

First Trans-Pecos Pecan Show to be Staged in Rankin Next Tuesday

A schedule of events, running thru most of the day, was released today for the 1st Trans-Pecos Pecan Show which will be held at the Rankin Park Building Tuesday, November 24.

Judging of pecans and food division entries will open at 10:00 a.m.

At 5:45 p.m. an informal Coke party for Queen contestants is to be held at the Rankin Country Club. Also invited are the judges.

At 7:30 p.m. the Queen pageant will get underway and will

include presentation of awards and an auction of the foods.

Judges for the show will include Paul Archinald of KOSA-TV in Odessa; Tylene Osborn, of Columbia Secretarial College, Odessa; and Liz Hargrove, of San Angelo. They will pick the queen.

Judging foods will be Mildred Eiland, Home Demonstration Agent, Stanton; Maxine Mayse, the HD Agent of Odessa; and Marty Stultz, WTU Home Economist, of San Angelo.

Pecan judges include B. G.

Hancock, Extension Horticulturist, A&M University; Ken Lindsey, Area Extension Agronomist, Fort Stockton; and Johnnie Harrison, County Agent, Monahans.

Rankin Football Teams Close Out Overall Successful Year

The B Team: Undefeated; 319-6



There have been B-Team seasons in the record books that have been quite as good as that posted by the B Team. Taking eight straight wins wasn't until the second game of their last game that they managed to get on the scoreboard—and that coming in a play that saw several defenders hit the ball be-

fore it bounded into the hands of the opposition.

Only in rare instances did an opponent get inside the Rankin 20 yard line. Along the way, the B Team rolled up a total of 319 points, scoring at the rate of almost 40 points per game.

With sixteen seniors graduating this year from the Red Devil A Team, this group will carry a big portion of the load for next year's varsity. They are, front row, l-r:

just now getting to the point where I can lay around and watch from four to six football games on television over a week-end.

After all, you have to sorta build up to a thing like that—to the point that you don't get saddle sores on your backside. If and when we do have to join in the workouts, perhaps we can get a

television set installed that we can watch while we're grunting through three or four pushups.

THE NUT SHOW—

Not too long ago, most of us over forty were back on the farm and as country folk, we had an abiding interest in such things as the annual fall harvest fairs that were popular in those days. That may account, in part for the big interest that is being shown in the Pecan Show that will be held here Tuesday. We've all still got a little bit of farmer left in our blood.

At any rate, those putting on the show report a great deal of interest in the affair with some one hundred entries expected in the foods division alone.

Of course one of the reasons for this interest is that a good many folk in the Rankin area now are pecan growers, thanks to a program of tree planting started here about three years ago. A pecan grower . . . that's anyone who has one or more trees and a good guess would be that that applies to over 50 percent of the local homeowners.

You might be interested in knowing that another town in the area, Crane, is now trying to get their people interested in putting out trees—thru the Chamber of Commerce, yet. Well, it will be a nice addition to Crane—or any town, but I think we ought to go on record right now that our pecans can outdo their pecans and if anyone can think of how to put it on, we'll challenge them to a duel, or game or whatever you do, to prove it.

We never did have much luck playing them in football but I'll give odds we can take them in a pecan match any day of the week.

CLIPPING—

This week, the Scoop received a thoroughly delightful letter from J. T. Merriman, a former Rankinite, now living in Levelland. He had a kind word or two for newspaper editors in general and even went so far as to invite me to visit with him if I should be up that way. I guess it was an invitation. He said, in part, "so if you are up this way at all, bring what you like to eat and come have supper with us."

But the main reason he wrote was to send a clipping from the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal that told of a fete by D. L. Flowers,

another former Rankinite. Those who have been here some years will remember that Flowers, now 42, lost both legs in an accident on a seismograph crew here back in 1954 when some of the equipment hit a high line.

The clipping tells how Flowers recently picked up several "hot" wires and moved them off a highway following a plane crash into a power line. The report states that spectators stood aghast because he wore no gloves or insulation. His deed cleared the area until an electrical service crew arrived.

In commenting on his heroics, Flowers didn't think it was such a great thing since he was wearing his artificial legs which, unlike metal attachments formerly used, were made of plastic and he knew he was well insulated.

A spokesman for the Public Service company said the broken wires carried 13,200 volts of electricity.

Now friends, that takes some kind of nerve for a man to do a thing like that after having lost both legs and almost his life to electrical wires—plastic legs notwithstanding.
