

It will now be interesting to see what comes out of Austin when the legislature meets next year. County by county, liquor by the drink took a pretty good thumping just as it did here in Upton County and it's doubtful that the representatives and congressmen from areas that voted "dry" are going to be too excited about rushing to open the first swinging, doors. The big city vote in a half dozen counties accounted for the overall approval.

Certainly, on a local option basis, a big portion of Texas will not-at this time-approve the opening of bars for hard stuff drinkers.

The thing that comes to my mind is-if a law is written in Austin, and it will be sooner or later-what effect will it have on places where liquor by the drink is now being sold? And it is being so dispensed and on a fairly large basis.

One example that comes to mind in our immediate area is in a neighboring county-which, incidentally, is dry-where a good sized operation is being carried out by a country club. Similar operations are scattered all over



the state and I'd guess that you could find fifty in a radius of 200 miles of Rankin-maybe more.

If the new law is written with teeth, and a high permit fee, it may turn out that many of these places will be put out of business. But then, on the other hand, they are against the law now and have been for a long time and I've yet to hear of one being closed.

It will be interesting, true, but probably not much will be changed.




