City, School Elections Lead List --

## Eighteen-Year-Olds Registering in Upton County

For the first time in the history of Upton County, Texas and the Nation, eighteen-year-olds are to be issued Voter Registration Certificates. And, according to the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector H. E. (Gene) Eckols, the newly franchised youths are not passing up the opportunity locally to get their right-to-vote certificates.

As of last Tuesday, some twelve youths between the ages of eighteen and twenty-one—the old

legal voting age limit—had registered in Rankin, Midkiff and McCamey. Surprisingly, this number compares most favorably on a percentage basis with their older counterparts eligible to vote in that approximately 100 of the 21-and-over voters have now been signed up on a county-wide basis, according to the Tax Assessor's office.

Deadline for all those who wish to secure Voter Registration Certificates is January 31. They may

one to cast a ballot in any of these three elections. In addition, there is the possibility of bond elections or special elections being called within the year.

"These off-year registrations are definitely important," Eckols said this week. "There's always the possibility of important matters coming before the voters in addition to the school boards, etc., and we certainly urge everyone to register."

#### LIMITS ON 18-YEAR OLDS

Even though the eighteen-yearolds have won their right to vote for the first time, they will still find themselves excluded from a big majority of the balloting. In recent rulings handed down by the United States Supreme Court, the 18, 19, and 20-year old voters are to be eligible to vote in Federal Elections only.

This means that no one under 21 will be permitted to participate in city, school or hospital elections, any called bond elections or votes of that nature—only in cases involving Federal office-holders. This restriction places a severe limit on the new voters for this year, nevertheless, it is possible that a Federal election might be held, therefore, it is of importance for them to register.

In order to register, the applicant must be eighteen before March 1, 1972—which in effect will register those now seventeen. The 18, 19, and 20 years age group, and those persons who are not yet 18, but will be 18 before March 1, 1972, will have their Certificates overstamped with the wording: "Federal Elections Only

# Vehicle Owners Cautioned to Look for Important Papers

A note of caution to all vehicle owners was issued this week by the office of H. E. (Gene)Eckols, Upton County Tax Assessor-Collector, to be on the lookout for important papers concerning 1971 vehicle registrations. These papers will be received by all individual automobile owners and will come in the mails from Texas Highway Department in Austin.

"Be on the lookout for these papers—in a white envelope," Eckols said. "They are very important and you must have them in order to register your vehicle this year."

New license plates will be put on sale February 1, however, all owners will receive the above mailing in January. The mailing of registration information directly to the vehicle owner from the Texas Highway Department was first tried last year and proved to be popular with all concerned since it simplified and speeded up the registration procedure.

at slightly lesser costs over the past twelve months included pupil transportation, plant maintenance and student body activity while cost increases were led by added expenses in instruction, capital outlay and operation of plant, along with others.

At the same time, for the year just completed, total funds available for operation of the district showed an increase—from \$795,-591.26 at the end of the 1969 year, to \$872,942.83 as of last August 31. The main increase in revenue came from local tax funds with \$575,189.51 being collected during the past year—up from the previous amount of \$525,347.41. State funds contributed also gained: up

from a total of 62,528.96 to a mark of \$77,704.27.

One category which showed a decline was in athletic events in which only \$6,548.37 was collected up to last August 31 as compared to \$8,420.20 for the previous accounting period. Receipts in this department are often influenced by attendance at football games which may vary greatly depending on the schedule played, the weather conditions, etc.

The balance in all funds as of last August 31 was up substantially over a year ago: \$162,877.88 compared to \$103,723.34. Figures for the report are taken from amounts listed in the annual audit of the district's operations.


