## City, School Elections Lead List --

# Eighteen-Year-Olds Registering in Upton County

For the first time in the history  
of Upton County, Texas and the  
Nation, eighteen-year-olds are to  
be issued Voter Registration Cer-  
tificates. And, according to the  
office of County Tax Assessor-  
Collector H. E. (Gene) Eckols, the  
newly franchised youths are not  
passing up the opportunity local-  
ly to get their right-to-vote cer-  
tificates.

As of last Tuesday, some twel-  
ve youths between the ages of  
eighteen and twenty-one—the old

legal voting age limit—had regis-  
tered in Rankin, Midkiff and  
McCamey. Surprisingly, this num-  
ber compares most favorably on  
a percentage basis with their old-  
er counterparts eligible to vote in  
that approximately 100 of the 21-  
and-over voters have now been  
signed up on a county-wide bas-  
is, according to the Tax Asses-  
sor's office.

Deadline for all those who wish  
to secure Voter Registration Cer-  
tificates is January 31. They may

# Vehicle Owners Cautioned to Look for Important Papers

A note of caution to all vehicle  
owners was issued this week by  
the office of H. E. (Gene) Eckols,  
Upton County Tax Assessor-Col-  
lector, to be on the lookout for  
important papers concerning 1971  
vehicle registrations. These pa-  
pers will be received by all indi-  
vidual automobile owners and  
will come in the mails from Tex-  
as Highway Department in Aus-  
tin.

"Be on the lookout for these  
papers—in a white envelope,"  
Eckols said. "They are very im-

portant and you must have them  
in order to register your vehicle  
this year."

New license plates will be put  
on sale February 1, however, all  
owners will receive the above  
mailing in January. The mailing  
of registration information direct-  
ly to the vehicle owner from the  
Texas Highway Department was  
first tried last year and proved  
to be popular with all concerned  
since it simplified and speeded  
up the registration procedure.

After February 1, 1971, vehic-

secure these at the Courthouse in  
Rankin or the McCamey Sub-Station  
during regular office hours,  
Monday through Friday, or, in  
certain instances may mail in an  
application. They may also be re-  
gistered by a direct member of  
their family, such as a father, a  
mother, sister or brother.

Although there are no state, lo-  
cal or national elections of a po-  
litical nature this year, there will  
be city, school and hospital dis-  
trict elections and a valid, up-to-  
date Voter Registration Certificate  
will be required in order for

le owners may take the entire  
packet received from the Highway  
Department to the Tax Asses-  
sor's office in the Courthouse in  
Rankin or the McCamey Sub-  
Station and purchase his plates.  
Or, if he so desires, mailing in-  
structions are included in the en-  
velope.

There has been no increase in  
registration fees for the coming  
year and Upton County is expect-  
ed to list over 4,000 vehicles of  
all types when the count is end-  
ed. Prices for the 1971 plates are  
listed on the information that is  
mailed from the Highway Depart-  
ment in Austin.

## Rankinite's Kin is Dead in Viet Nam

Word was received last Sunday  
by the family of Clarence Winn

had been killed in action in Viet  
Nam. Full details were not imme-  
diately available nor was it known  
when the soldier would be re-  
turned home for burial.

Winn was 26 years old and the  
son of the late Elvin Winn, broth-  
er to Clarence. It was his second  
tour of duty in Viet Nam.

one to cast a ballot in any of  
these three elections. In addition,  
there is the possibility of bond  
elections or special elections be-  
ing called within the year.

"These off-year registrations are  
definitely important," Eckols said  
this week. "There's always the  
possibility of important matters  
coming before the voters in ad-  
dition to the school boards, etc.,  
and we certainly urge everyone  
to register."

## LIMITS ON 18-YEAR OLDS

Even though the eighteen-year-  
olds have won their right to vote  
for the first time, they will still  
find themselves excluded from a  
big majority of the balloting. In  
recent rulings handed down by the  
United States Supreme Court, the  
18, 19, and 20-year old voters are  
to be eligible to vote in Federal  
Elections only.

This means that no one under  
21 will be permitted to participate  
in city, school or hospital elec-  
tions, any called bond elections  
or votes of that nature—only in  
cases involving Federal office-  
holders. This restriction places a  
severe limit on the new voters  
for this year, nevertheless, it is  
possible that a Federal election  
might be held, therefore, it is of  
importance for them to register.

In order to register, the appli-  
cant must be eighteen before  
March 1, 1972—which in effect  
will register those now seventeen.  
The 18, 19, and 20 years age  
group, and those persons who are  
not yet 18, but will be 18 before  
March 1, 1972, will have their  
Certificates over-stamped with the  
wording: "Federal Elections Only  
Until 21 Years of Age."
