## Official Census Data is Released

ED. NOTE: In the opinion of the editor, the following report contains a number of errors and is not printed as a record of fact.

Upton County's official population in the 1970 census was 4,697, down 24.7 percent from the 1960 figure of 6,239, the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce reports

The 1970 census counted 4,358 white persons in Upton County, 92.8 percent of the total: 171 Negroes, and 168 persons of other races. In 1960, 95.6 percent of the population was white.

The census showed 432 children under 5 years; 1,384 in ages 5 through -17; 2,517 people 18 thru

64; and 364 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 2,357 married people, 215 who were widowed, 71 divorced, and 696 never married.

Upton County's 1970 poplation was classified as 56.4 percent urban, and 43.6 percent rural (Ha!)

There were 1,462 households, with 4,697 persons, including 226 one-person households.

The 1970 census counted 1,819 housing units in Upton County, 995 of them occupied by owners, 467 occupied by tenants, and 357 vacant. These include vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970 was 54.7 percent, compared with 45.7 percent in 1960.

Among year-round dwelling units there were 1,614 single family houses, 88 housing units in multiunit buildings, and 68 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 13 1. compared with 20,2 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 1,407 had piped water, toilet, and bath, while 55 lacked some or all plumbing.

The median value of owner- occupied houses in Upton County was \$5,500, compared with less than \$5,000 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was \$51 per month, compared with \$60 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

### Date Finals to Give Rankin Two Rodeos This Summer

With the announcement of June 4th and 5th as dates for the 22nd Annual Upton County 4-H Club All Kid Rodeo, Rankin moved ahead with plans for making 1971 a banner year in Junior Rodeos. Already set is an AJRA sanctioned rodeo to follow the 4-H Show, on July 2, 3, and 4.

Plans for the 4-H Rodeo call for it to be presented with much the same foremat as in the past This will include rodeo performances nightly at 8:00 p.m. and a horseshow on Saturday, June 5, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

Trophies will be awarded winners in rodeo events while trophies and ribbons will go to horseshow placings.

In last Monday's meeting of the Rankin Lions Club in which they hosted committees from other local civic organizations interested in helping put on the July 4th rodeo, four groups, in addition to the Lions, were represented.

Since some were in the process of changing officers in the very near future, it was decided to meet again next month for further planning.

#### 4-H Judging Team is First in Odessa

The Upton County 4-H Club's Livestock Judging Team, composed of Tommy Batchelor, Jimmie McBee, Tommy Johnson, Jr, and Diane Day, took top honors in the recent Odessa Livestock Judging Contest. Competing against 22 teams, the Upton unit placed first.

Batchelor, of Midkiff, tied for high individual honors for the entire show while Johnson, of Mc Camey, was high individual in the swine judging. McBee, also of Midkiff, was third high overall-

As a team, the Upton youths were high in swine, third in sheep and third in cattle judging. They earned a total of 6 medals and 2 trophies.

This Saturday, March 13, they will compete in a similiar judging contest in San Angelo which is expected to be one of the largest in entries in which the Upton group will participate-

#### Upton Registers 2005 in Vote Total

Final voter registration for Upton County, following the reopening of sign-ups through February 28, reached 2,005. Of this figure, 132 are in the 17-20 age bracket and, as things now stand, they will be eligible to vote only in Federal elections-of which none are currently scheduled for 1971.

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BEERED UP-

On the matter of slapping taxes on the citizenry, it's always interesting to note the various approaches proposed down in Austin for raking in the long green. One proposal that comes up every time the Legislature meets— and it has already been proposed this session — is to raise the tax on beer.

Now let me say right now that as for me personally, I couldn't care less how big a tax is put on beer but the tax proposal itself is always intriguing to me.

Proponents of the increased tax on beer always point out that Ok-' lahoma and Louisiana have higher taxes on beer than Texas—and this is true. The interesting part

is that those who back the beer tax have no intention of participating in its purchase. It's the old sin tax gimmick that has been around for so long in Texas: if you don't approve of something, tax it out of existance.

The only thing wrong with this theory is that it won't work. In the case of beer, the beer drinkers are going to buy it no matter the cost—just as those of us who smoke will continue to do so, tax or no tax.

One can't help wondering if perhaps those who are such strong supporters of these selective taxes are not well aware of this and are, in fact, simply trying to put the tax burden on someone else-If we're going to put a tax on what some consider sin, then let's tax greed, prejudice, spitefulness, envy and the gossipy tongue—give everyone a chance to participate. Impossible to collect such a tax, you say. You're right. It would be.

But, and this is a sincere proposal, if we're really interested in a selective tax that will cover everyone alike and one in which Texas is not up to par with the other states in the nation, then why don't we raise the state gaso-

line tax

Only Texas, Hawaii, and Missouri of the entire fifty states has a 5c state gasoline tax (authority: Federal Income Tax Forms, Page 8). All others are higher and range up to 9-cents in Washington—a lot have 7 and 8-cents.

Now I'm not looking for ways nor approving of the State of Texas collecting any more taxes in any manner but I get a little sick of those who would be so free in taxing the other fellow while avoiding their share—but participating in all state services.

It makes you wonder just how honest to goodness good some folk really are.

#### THE 4-H RODEO-

The question has been put to The Scoop: with all the publicity that has been going to the AJRA Rodeo, are we going to forget our 4-H Club All Kid Rodeo?

I don't think so. The 4-H Rodeo, which will stage its 22nd annual event June 4th and 5th, is a well established feature in Rankin and facilities we now have at the local arean leave no reason why any number of rodeos or events of this nature would not be a success-

In the case of the AJRA show, it's a new venture and has to be organized and put on its feet. If it should become established, it—along with the 4-H Club rodeo—should make Rankin something of a teenage rodeo capitol.

#### CHEESE IS TASTY CONVENIENCE FOOD

Convenient, instant and ready-to serve are appealing terms to the busy, time-conscious person. And cheese is one food that fits this description.

The convenience and versatility of cheese cannot be overestimated. Since it comes ready to serve, it is a real help when a meal must be prepared in a hurry.

Cheese has enough protein to be used as a tasty main dish. And there is no waste. Half a pound served in a main dish will supply four persons with protein for one meal.

Enjoy the flavor of cheese as it comes from the package or combined with other foods. It is hard to imagine spaghetti, macaroni or grilled sandwiches without cheese.

Don't be alarmed by the fact that there are almost 400 varieties of cheese. Most of these are variations of only 10 basic types, differing by several inter-related characteristics, such as hardness and the method of ripening.

Remember that the soft, moist cheeses are more perishable than the hard, aged types. When using cheese, simply cut off the amount you need and tightly rewrap the unused portion.

1 8-oz. package cream cheese 8-oz. process American cheese. shredded (2 cups)

In blazer pan of small chafing dish melt cream cheese slowly over direct heat, stirring constantly. Add American cheese, milk, onion salt, mustard, and hot pepper sauce. Cook, stirring constantly, till cheeses melt. Add bacon Keep warm over hot water. Serve with assorted crackers. (If mixture becomes too thick, stir in a little milk.) Makes about one and a half cups.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE in these programs as it deems LEGISLATURE OF THE appropriate. STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 51-a. The Legisla-

ture shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, sub-ject to limitations herein conture be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for re-habilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amend-ed, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for re-

medical care for, and for re-habilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the bound-aries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25)

years; "(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicapes: mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons; "(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.
