A letter-writing campaign has been launched in America by interested organizations, groups and individuals whose goal is to send one million letters to the North Vietnamese Delegation when it meets in Paris, France, on April 1, 1971. The ultimate purpose is to urge -BEG - more humane treatment of our American prisoners of war being held captive in North Vietnam as set out in the Geneva Conference.

Just a few dozen letters from individuals who have a father, husband or son being held captive will make very little, if any, impression upon the government of North Vietnam. But, when the the North Vietnamese Delegation has one million letters dumped into their laps when they meet in Paris April 1, they can't completely ignore them.
