Friona, County Voters Give Cox Margin

Parmer County voters, like those throughout the area and unlike the state majority, went for Republican Jack Cox in Tuesday's governor's race.

Cox carried sis of the county's eight boxes in compiling a 1008-919 vote edge over Democrat John Connally, who was elected Tuesday by a considerable margin.

Connally carried only the Bovina precinct (209-129) and Oklahoma Lane (77-70), as well as having an edge in absentee votes, 20-17.

Otherwise, Democratic candidates had the advantage over Republicans in the other races, although some GOP candidates carried various boxes in the county.

In the race for Congressman-at-large, Democrat Joe Pool

was given a slight edge over Republican Des Barry, 1061-937. Barry carried the same six precincts that Cox carried in the governor's race, however.

Walter Rogers, Democratic incumbent for congressman of the 18th District, received a 1125-885 vote from Parmer County, although Friona went for Republican Jack Seale (337-319), as did Rhea (34-18), and Lakeview (29-27).

Parmer County resident John Zahn, defeated in his bid for state senator by Democratic incumbent Andy Rogers, was defeated by Rogers in the county, 1202-983. Zahn's only margin in the county was in his hometown precinct at Farwell, 205-

Bill Clayton, Democrat elected to the office of state representative for the 91st District, got an edge of 1170-841 in the county, Frank Ford, Republican candidate, had majorities at Black and Rhea, and the two tied at Lakeview, 28-

Otherwise, it was the Democrats all the way, although Republican candidates, as they did statewide, picked up considerably more support than has usually been the case on state and district levels.

County voters joined those throughout the state in turning thumbs down proposed state constitutional amendment number 14, the "Trial de Novo" proposal,

There may have been some indecision about others on the bulky amendment agenda, but there was none on this one, as Parmer voters went against, 1,116 to 263.

As a matter of fact, county voters went on record as in favor of only three of the amendments. They were number 2 (welfare increase), by a 766-668 vote; number 4 (water reservoirs), by 720-657, and number 8 (disability payments),

The number voting was surely a record for the county for an "off year" election. Almost 2,000 persons turned out, which was about double the number that voted in 1958, the last time a governor was elected when there was no president being

Heavy voting caused the county totals to be late being assembled, in Friona, where 669 people voted, tabulators worked until after 1 a.m. Wednesday counting the ballots. and in Bovina, it was 3 a.m. before all the ballots were counted.

There are cases each year where a farmer's monthly social security benefits are delayed because he has not kept good farm records, Hal Geldon, District Manager, of the Amarillo Social Security Office, said

Complete and accurate records are necessary not only for good farm management but for getting proper and continuous protection for social security

benefits as well, he said. Geldon explained that farm operators are required to make accurate reports of wages for their hired hands and to report their own earnings to the Internal Revenue Service for social security purposes. Good farm records assure prompt and accurate payments of social security payments to the farm-

These records do not have to elaborate, Geldon added, but they should show the various types of farm income and ex-

penses. Information on becoming eligible for social security benefits may be obtained from the Amarillo Social Security Office, Boil in accumulated liquid and 1006 Adams Street.
