## Loss in Tax Values Facing RISD

Tentative figures placed before the group at the meeting indicated that the district faces the loss of some $\$ 10$ million in values in the next taxing year. These amounts have been determined by Thomas Y. Pickett and Company the tax experts employed by the District.
With last year's tax base put at $\$ 55,466,000$, the new figure is down to $\$ 45,446,000$ with the big losses coming ${ }^{4}$ in oil property value located within the district.

To further offset the loss and to meet the proposed budget for the coming year, the Board, in their Tuesday meeting, tentatively set the tax rate for 1971-72 at $\$ 1.25$, up ten cents from the $\$ 1.15$ rate of the current year.

A hearing on the proposed budget has been scheduled for 8:00 p.m., June 8.

In other matters, the Board approved the salary for the head coach and athletic director for next year at $\$ 12,500$, up some $\$ 1,000$ from last year. The in-

In the first place, voters would have no say-so over those appointed to the commission. And another strike against it would be the pressure brought to bear on the commission to recommend always higher salaries to say nothing of their having no real power to regulate the ethics of elected officials.

State lawmakers do need an increase in salary but there ought to be a better way. An interesting side note of this amendment is a large advertisement in the Texas State Teachers Associations magazine, urging teachers "to support those who have supported you" or words to that effect. In plain English, we got you a raise, now get us one. A block vote by teachers might well put the measure over. It will be interesting.

## I'll vote no.

Amendment No. 2 would permit the Legislature to propose constitutional amendments at any time, rather than at every two year session. Personally, I'd rather see an amendment prohibit-
more often than once every ten years but I guess that wouldn't be much of a way to run a railroad.
I'll vote for this one-not that it's anything great but there is the possibility of needing an a. mendment to the constitution at any time rather than every two years.
No 3 has to do with welfare and, Buddy, that's a touchy subject. I, for one, get pretty tired of those in favor of big welfare programs always talking about kids and old folks starving to death. It may be that we have had some who did just that but it's odd that you never hear of any cases when the lack of food being available was the cause. We have had neglect by parents of some children, I'm sure and some old people may have met with this fate but again, I would expect that there were extenuating circumstances - not simply because they couldn't get any food. They want to raise the ceiling on welfare. We just raised it not too long age. And you can bet that they will be back be-
fore long wanting to raise it again.
But, I will vote for this one too, not because I'm sold on the arguements for it but becauselike most of us-I don't want to take the chance that an elderly person or a child might actually be in need and there would be no money available.
But I think we ought to serve notice on our lawmakers that we don't want to see anyone driving up to the welfare office in fancy automobiles to make application and get a hand-out,
No. 4, called the Clean Water Amendment, is very simple. It's a tax increase. If you think you want to help dig up money to pay off $\$ 100$, plus interest, just so the folk in big lowns can play around with sewer water treatmen, then vote for it.

In previous reports I presented
explanations of the first and 4th propositions．Today the second and third will be discussed，
No． 2 is quite simple，provid－ ing merely that amendments may be submitted by any session of the legislature．At present they can be submitted to voters only by passage during regular ses－ sions．The sponsors of the propos－ ed change point to the fact that regular sessions are held only once each two years and that emergencies arise between these periods which sometimes need emergency attention．

No， 3 has wider consequences，
subject of welfare support ceil－ ings．Presently Texas has an $\$ 80$ million ceiling for all types of welfare support so far as the state＇s share is involved
Greatly increased costs of me－ dical care for the elderly，（in－ cluding nursing home cases）have created a severe problem for the state＇s needy aged，as well as the disabeled and the blind．It is felt by supporters that they must be provided for in a growing state which has concern for those un－ able to care for themselves．
