Says Local Board 121 Secretary --

Local Draft Still Very Much Alive

The draft for Upton County young men—as it is for all such eligible males in the U. S. —is still on. This bit of information was handed to the press today by Mrs. Mae R. Williams, executive secretary of Texas Local Board No. 121, serving Upton, Crane and Reagan Counties, as she attempted to answer some of the questions concerning the current draft situation. No men have actually been called into service for the past several weeks due to a hassle in Congress over the draft law extension.

"Our local board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify men, and to order for preinduction physical examination those young men who may be needed to fill draft calls in the coming month," Mrs. Williams said.

Men with lottery number thru 125 were eligible for induction in June in order to fill draft calls. Since then, the Defense Department has asked Selective Service to draft 16,000 men in July-August. This request is being held by Selective Service headquarters pending final Congressional action on the draft bill, which, according to Selective Service, is expected within several weeks.

Those young men with relatively low lottery numbers who are eligible for induction this year, particularly those with numbers below 175—the current processing ceiling—have a very good chance of being processed for induction after draft calls are restored, the secretary has pointed out.

"Many young men seem to think that the Selective Service Act has permanently expired and that they probably will never be inducted. Some of them think that the entire system has stopped. They are wrong since it is only the induction authority that has expired. They, therefore, may be unintentionally breaking the law by failing to register at age 18,

by not keeping their local boards informed of their current address or by failing to report for their preinduction physical," stated a portion of the news release.

Mrs. Williams also stressed that local boards are continuing to consider C. O., hardship, and student deferments and to take other classification actions. "The young men who had planned to submit requests for deferments or exemptions are encouraged to do so. The expiration of induction authority does not affect our responsibility to classify young men," Mrs. Williams added.

August Bargains Offered on News

Special rates on subscriptions to The Rankin News go into effect August 1. This is the beginning of the once-a-year price reduction made on the newspaper prices by mail.

Reductions in prices will be the same as in past years with 50-cents deducted from the regular yearly rates. These are \$3.75 for mailing addresses within Upton County and \$4.00 for those outside the county. With the fifty-cent reduction, the prices become \$3.25 and \$3.50 until August 31.

Additional discounts are also offered to those who pay for more than one subscription or who renew for more than one year at a time. This reduction amounts to another 50-cents per subscription or yearly renewal.

"And all who pay at the office in person will get a big smile," said editor Hutchens since the rate has gone to 10 cents on the self return envelopes used for the benefit of subscribers during the August bargain rate sale.

"And just to be different, we don't take credit cards," he noted. "We will, however, extend a little credit, but cash will definitely put you on the top shelf."

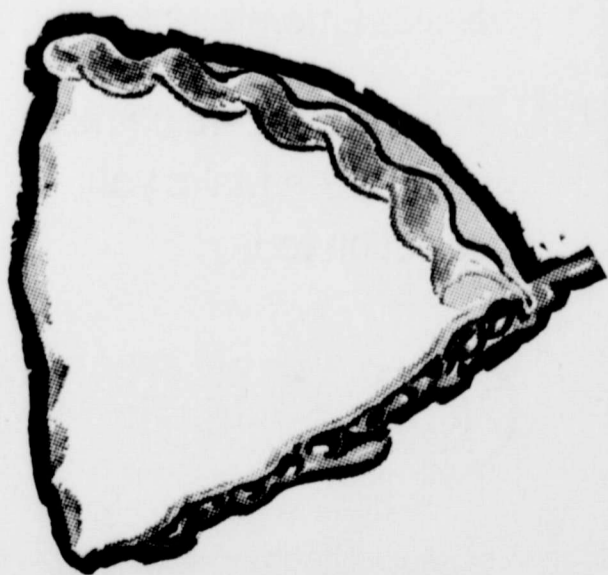

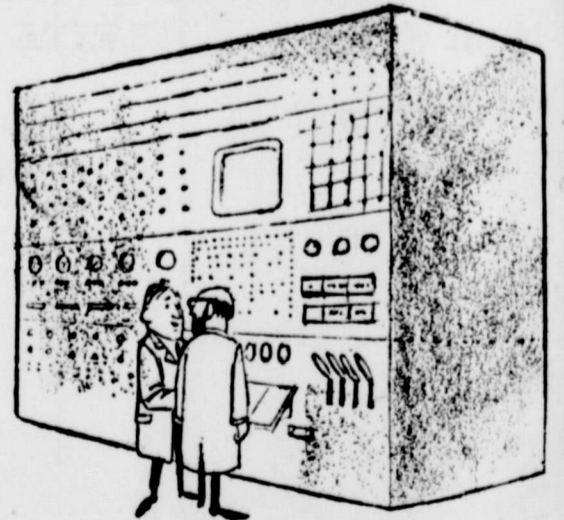
