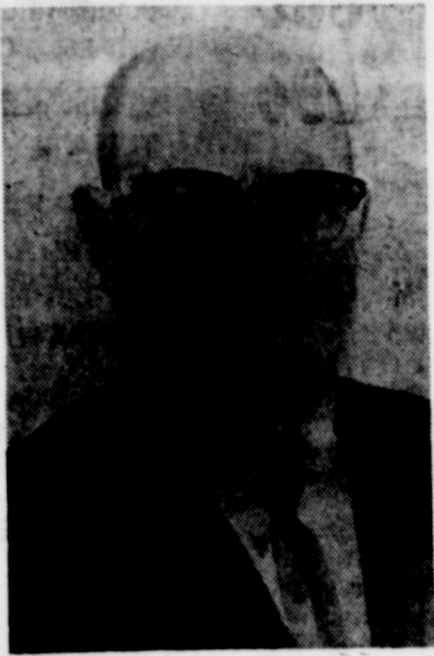

Registration for the 1971-1972 school year at Rankin Schools is to start Friday, August 13. First full day of school will be Monday, August 23, according to information released this week by the school administration office.

last spring, are to register Friday, August 13. They should report to the high school principal, Mr. A. C. Copeland, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

here to the above schedule and only for emergency reasons will there be any deviation. Students are also requested to wear conventional clothing when they register.

Due to a scheduled cooperative teacher inservice program and workshop to be held in McCamey, August 17 and 18, registration of students will be altered somewhat from the previous years. Schools participating in the inservice program include Rankin, McCamey, Iraan, Crane, Big Lake, Imperial and Grandfalls. The entire faculty of the respective schools will converge on the McCamey Schools for the two-day training session. According to latest reports, outstanding educators from throughout the state have been contacted and are to conduct the joint workshop.

On Thursday, August 19, students who attended Rankin High last year and who will be classified as Juniors and Seniors during the upcoming year are to report to the principal. Freshmen and sophomores will then register on Friday, August 20. Registration hours will also be from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

"It is expected that we will have adult visitors on our campus the days of registration, and students reporting in shorts, sleeveless shirts, etc. may be asked to return home and change clothing before they register, stated the high school principal.

### ELEMENTARY - JR. HIGH

It is requested that all new elementary students, grades kindergarten through Grade 4 who did not attend Rankin Schools last year, report to the elementary building and Mrs. Mike Hughes, principal. Mr. Hughes states that those kindergarten and first graders who have already received their notices or information of their registration need not report. Registration is to be carried out between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 12 noon.

Mr. E. G. Walker will register new students in Grades 5 through 8 on Thursday, August 19, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. He, too, noted that those students who attended the Rankin Schools last year and who pre-registered need not take any further action until opening day of school on August 23.

### School Annuals to be Delivered 19 - 20

The 1970-71 "Red Devil" annuals will be distributed in the main foyer of the high school on Thursday and Friday, August 19 and 20, according to announcements made this week by the high school principal's office.

Distribution will be to students in all grade levels and all will be distributed at the one location in the high school. The yearbooks are to be issued only on the two days stated above. Students not receiving their annuals at this time will have to pick them up at the high school principal's office following the beginning of the school term.

Students are urged to have their annual receipts with them and those who owe a balance on their books must make full payment before receiving delivery.

## Man, Dig That Crazy Rainfall

For a portion of the state currently enjoying the benefits of being declared a Federal emergency drought area, Rankin and Upton County—along with most other parts of West Texas—has had a bit of a problem for the past two weeks or so. It has been too wet to get out and check to see if the drought is still on.

Some say, as the rains continue to fall for over twelve hours straight at press time, that we are approaching the point where another four or five inches might ease the situation. Some native grasses have grown as much as four inches in the last ten days and a sight not too often seen in this area greets one and all—the hills are green.

Although Rankin proper — by arrangement of the City Water Department who sells the stuff—has had only 2.5" of moisture since the 1st of August, areas around town have gauged that much and more in one "shower".

Mr. Fred Welling reported .75 of an inch for Rankin Tuesday night and .40" prior to that. In addition to the rain, Rankin continues to enjoy fall weather at a time of year when it should be (Continued to Back Page)

Minutes from the Monday meeting of the court concerning the transaction read in part:

"It is recognized that an emergency now exists in Upton County in that ambulance service is needed in the City of McCamey for the protection and benefit of citizens now living in that area. On a motion by Commissioner Fletcher, duly seconded by Commissioner LaQuey that the Upton County budget for 1971 under General Fund in the miscellaneous be amended to be read:

Ambulance equipped, \$6,500.00;  
Total Miscellaneous, \$33,450.00.

Although the record shows that all four Commissioners voted in favor of the purchase, one of them

has since had a change of mind as he sets out in an advertisement appearing elsewhere in this issue of the News.

In other actions relative to the ambulance, the court appointed Commissioner Fletcher to work with Ed Gorman and Kirby Dawkins of McCamey Emergency Services, Inc. toward the locating and buying an equipped ambulance for Upton County. The Court also voted to make null and void an agreement made on May 24, 1971, concerning contributions toward operating of an ambulance for the Rankin Hospital District and McCamey Hospital District.

The minutes of the court do not indicated who or what concern is to operate and maintain the ambulance; however, it is assumed that it will be the McCamey Hospital District.

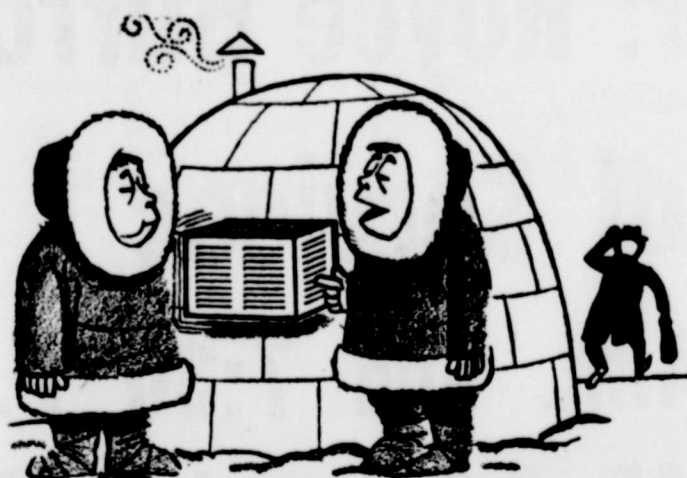

Friends, Rankinites and sports-fans, we come here to praise the Red Devils, not to bury them.

Yes, it's that time of year again—football season—and the Red Devils take to the practice field next Monday. That's something many folk always await in high anticipation for the Red Devils enjoy a following in this sport like they do in no other.

As you readers from past years well know, the column of 4th & 10 is devoted entirely to the football program and runs thru the season. It makes no attempt or claim to be an authority on the game and—as you may also recall—can miss 'em a mile when it comes to picking winners. One reason for this is that this is a highly slanted piece of news reporting with everything written with the intent of making Rankin look good. No bones are made about that fact.

And with that clearly established, we'll turn to the upcoming season.

Rankin is picked last in district standings which, in my opinion, means absolutely nothing. Few if any of the pre-season pickings ever turn out—in this column or any other—to be very accurate; however, I would maintain that almost twenty years of experience in working with Red Devil teams over the years gives me a slight edge—in seniority, if nothing else—in commenting on our local squads and I can assure you that we won't finish in last place.

Well then, will we be in first? I doubt that anyone can say at this time aside from a lucky guess for three teams are, as of now, definite possibilities: Rankin, Iraan and Van Horn. Should any one of the other three be at the top of the heap when the regular season ends, it would be a mighty big upset.

Iraan has been picked as the top team in the district and they believe it. Having had occasion to be in Iraan last week, I noted a number of signs on store



windows etc. that read "State in '71". They appear to be dead set on trying to maintain that first place slot but, if they have the same schedule as last year, their non-conference games could put a kink in their plans for they play a real rough schedule—even rougher than the Rankin lads.

Van Horn, although they lost a number of pretty good ball players through graduation, will again have a good team. They are well coached and being a "big" Class A school, have more from which to choose. The major dark horse will be Sanderson and we'll have to wait and see

what they come up with.

As for the Red Devils, they are going to be young, and we, too, lost some boys who left pretty big shoes to be filled. Among the highest hopes will be the few returning veterans from last season plus the boys moving up from last year's B-Team. And right there may well determine how far we go.

As all fans will recall, we had some kind of B-Team last fall. They rolled over everyone they played and there were no soft touches on their schedule. Now comes the question of whether or not they will be able to move up

to varsity ball and perform as well. Time will give us the answer and it may not come until well along in the season as the younger players learn the ropes "in the big league."

For a little crystal ball gazing, I would say that Rankin's 1971 Red Devils will be one of the more exciting teams to watch that has played here in some years. They are going to have a considerable amount of talent, a group of dedicated lads and they will be well coached. I look for their offense to be able to run the ball against all opponents and with this in mind, many

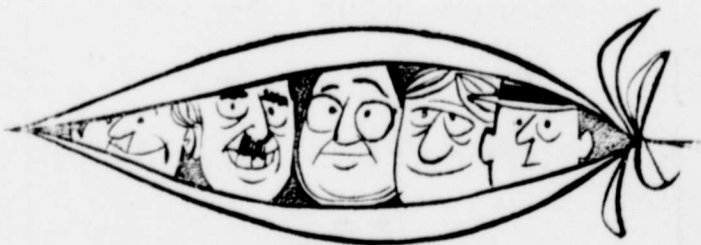
### Are You Ready for the Second Coming of Jesus?
