State Rep. Tom Craddick of Midland was a visitor in Rankin Tuesday. As things now stand under the redistricting plan announced last week end, Upton County will now be in Criddick's district. Previously, Upton was in the 62nd District and was represented by George Baker of Fort Stockton.

Craddick, 28 years old, was the Representative who filed the law suit against the redistricting plan adopted by the last session of the Texas Legislature. His contention that it was unconstitutional was upheld by the Texas courts.

Although the present plan is also headed for court tests, Rep-Craddick said Tuesday that he did not foresee any changes in the present alignment that puts Upton County in his district. Playing with a pretty hot hand last Friday night, the Red Devils could do little wrong against the hapless Clint Lions when it came to putting points on the board. Most of Rankin's plays come off like a Wednesday evening workout and on defense, they never made any killer misques.

But to say they played a great game would be stretching a point pretty far. When you give up 100 yards in penalities — especially when you're winning—you have played anything but a great game. Against anything like a strong team, you are beaten.

Johnson's Phone 693-2841 And most of the penalties were assessed away from the area of the ball and on offense — the worst kind. Such antics are a sure sign of not using the old noggin.

But, as 'tis said, "all's well that ends well" and, certainly, Rankin has to be pretty well satisfied with the overall outcome. The hard truth of the matter, however, is that we won't stand much of a chance of winning any more ball games this year if we spot Van Horn, Iraan or Sanderson 100 yards via penalties. They're too tough for that.

And, oddly enough, should we not win any of the remaining three games, we'd wind up right where we were picked at the beginning of the season—last. As it now stands, either clint, Socorro or Sanderson would join us but that is not much consolation.

Is it now stacks-up, final district standings—including the winner—are going to be determined from these last three games. Sanderson, Clint and Socorro are about out of it but a win by any one of them could have a great bearing if against Iraan, Rankin or Van Horn.

Things are fixing to get real interesting.

THE OLD PROS-

Almost half—12 out of 25—of the 1971 Red Devil varsity are Freshmen or Sophomores, and most of them are regulars and all are in the game one time or another. These are at a tender age in today's football.

A senior ball player is generally in his sixth year of competition in today's high school football—seventh year in schools that start them playing in the 6th Grade. If he's been a regular player, he's participated in some forty-three regulation games by the time he begins his senior year, not counting a possible half dozen game-type scrimmages.

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That adds up to a lot of experience. By the same token, the Sophomore has played in only a possible twenty-three games at the start of his year—the freshman perhaps has had 13 or so junior high games. When you look at it in this light, you can easily see why the team with the large number of seniors is always figured to be tough.

And you can also see what a truly remarkable job this year's Red Devil squad has truned in. When most of us older types had a hand in the game, it was pretty simple. If you were a lineman on defense, you lined up seven a cross, nose to nose and toe to toe and if you were bigger or faster than your opposite, you ran right over him. If that didn't work, you could always throw a little dirt in his face when the ball was snapped—then you had better be bigger and faster.

But it's not a simple game anymore. Depending on a step the quarterback may take—or any of the backs or an end, a lineman's responsibility can change at almost any time in the play. Today's linebacker has to almost be a walking computer. In fact, no position on the team be it offense or defense, is a cut and dried assignment any more.

It's a thinking man's game today and I have nothing but admiration for those who play it well. But I sure am looking forward to the time when we can have twelve or fifteen of these "old pro" seniors on our starting line-up. And it's coming.

THIS WEEK-


