Activities call for pecan judging at 9:00 a.m., foods judging at 10:00 and the Queen Pageant at 7:30 p.m. Sale of foods will follow the queen judging. Non-placing foods will be sold beginning at 9:00 a.m. (Continued to Page 7)

## RHS GRAD GETS SCHOLARSHIP FOR GEOSCIENCE WORK AT TEXAS TECH

Lubbock — Terry Gray, a graduate student in Texas Tech University's Department of Geosciences was presented a \$500 scholarship grant by Pennzoil United, Inc. on Nov. 9.

Gary, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Gray of Rankin, is a graduate of Rankin High School and this marks the second time he has received a substantial scholarship while at Tech. In addition to the \$500 presented November 9, the oil firm has offered to pay for certain other portions of Gray's school costs.

Another grant in the amount of \$500 was presented by the company to the department to further research and instructional programs in the area of geoscience at Texas Tech.

Gray plans to go into exploration geology following completion of his master's degree in geosciences at Tech.

## Salvation Army Expenditures Told

Reporting on the activities of the local unit of the Salvation Army for the past fiscal year, the Rev. Gordon Miller said today that a total of \$97.88 was spent for services rendered. The major part of this, \$86.52, was spent for transient services, including \$16.48 for lodging, \$49.58 for meals or groceries in local restaurants or stores and \$20.46 for transportation (gas and oil bought from local service stations).

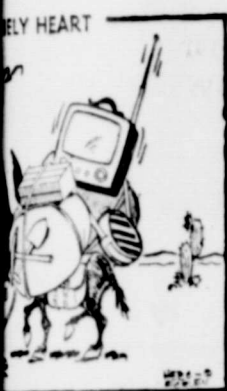

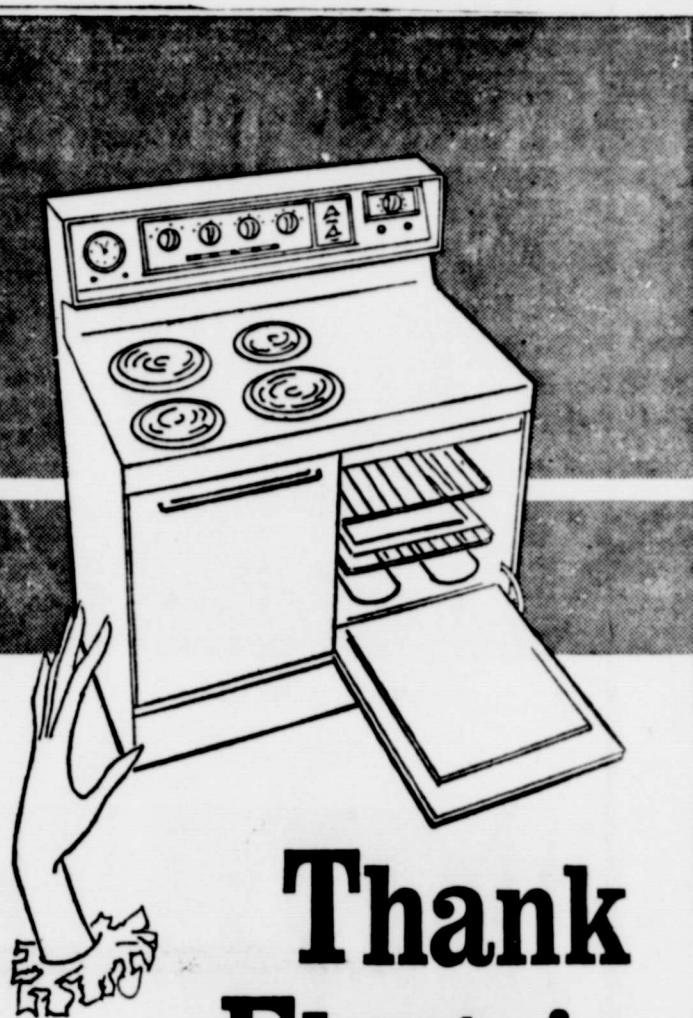

As far as Rankin is concerned the football season is over. It was a good one and but for a bounce or two of the ball, we would all be whooping it up and heading for bi-district against Plains. Such

But 1971 was a good season for Rankin and the Red Devils. It had all the necessary ingredients of excitement, promises and disappointments that go into a thrilling season and best of all, perhaps, is the promise of "next year." With the boys who will be back and those on the way up, the Red Devils would have been considered contenders in the old District 6-A.

With the new make-up and Van Horn gone, we still must rate at or near the top and 1972 surely will be the year of the Red Devils.

It's true that we are losing only four seniors this year, but they won't be easily replaced. Their graduation will make a big difference in the local squad and in a glance into the crystal ball for '72, it is not too hard to imagine you can see a somewhat different type of ball club for Rankin. This may be particularly noticeable on offense. Defensively, we ought to be tough as nails and any ball team that puts more than a couple of marks on the board will have to be pretty good.

In fact, you can look well forward into the immediate years ahead and, barring an unforeseen shift of school patrons, Rankin is set for the next half dozen years. 1972 ought to be the beginning year of a long reign of Rankin Class A domination in the district in which the hallmark has become that of a group that will put the hit on and the opponent will know it.

Starting back about a half dozen years ago, this aggressiveness in Red Devil football began to emerge and it seems to be a mark of pride with the teams that have followed. True, they have made their share of mistakes but one thing they have done—and with vigor—is hit, and after all, that's what the game of football is all about—a physically aggressive game in which the team that gives it the biggest effort quite often wins when they should not.
