



Bovina Man Sentenced; Files Appeal

R. G. Sparks of Bovina was given a 30-year sentence by Judge E. A. Bills, in the latter's final act as district judge in the county last Friday is Farwell.

Sparks was found guilty of rape in a trial heard early in December, His attorney, Clifford Brown of Brown and Schuman, Lubbock, made a motion for a new trial, which was overruled by Judge Bills.

Brown then filed with the Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin. "It will probably be three to five months before results of the appeal are known," said District Attorney Jack Young.


billion on beef, pork, veal, and lamb. That was about a fourth of all money spent on food and added up to \$277 per family.

This news comes from the Economic Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture which notes that we spent more on meat than household utilities, television sets, and radios combined.

In the early 1920's the annual meat bill per person amounted to about \$34 for 134 pounds of meat. In 1961 it was \$90 for 161 pounds.


Only 4.5% of our take-home pay, however, was needed for meat in 1961, as compared with 6.7% in the 1920's. About half the meat dollar goes for processing and marketing. though this varies depending on the type of meat.



Senior Max Reeve is the leading field goal shooter by percentage, hitting 44.2 per cent of his shots, 19 of 43 attempts. Junior S. D. Baize leads the free throw department with a percentage of 71.4, hitting 15 of 21 attempts.

After Buckley's 10.7 scoring average, they fall off quite a bit. Dale Milner and Billy Thomas have the next best average at 5.5 points per game. S. D. Baize, who has just started scoring lately, is next at 5.3.

Buckley has taken the most field goal shots and foul shots on the team. His field goal percentage of 36.6 is second to Reeve, and his free throw mark, as well as Reeve's is close to the team leader.

As a team, the Chiefs have averaged just 34.9 points per game, so they haven't been an offensive machine thus far in the season. Their season high score was in the Happy Tournament against Olton, whom they beat 47-21

The Chiefs' low score came at Canyon, a game they lost, 36-18. The highest an opponent has scored against Friona has been 56 points, by Tulia and White Deer, both strong teams. The lowest score by an opponent was by Nazareth in the consolation finals at Happy, 20 points.


