## Board Orders Accounts to be Audited; Asks for Three Bids

County Hospital's Board of Directors held their regular meeting last Tuesday, January 11 and attended to several matters. Among these was in-charge with the law creating a District—to file all unpaid bills with the County Clerk and a public hearing will be held for publication.



# Telephone Growth Marked in Rankin Area



Southwestern Bell anticipates telephone growth in 1972.

More than 780 telephones were in service in Rankin as of December 1, John Zittle, manager for Southwestern Bell, said today.

"Telephone growth is considered a good indicator of overall economic growth," Zittle said. "The addition of 217 phones in the last 10 years shows that Rankin is on the grow."

Zittle said Rankin residents are using their phones more, too. Last year, 2,044 calls were dialed here on an average business day.

Looking to the future, Zittle said local telephone projects scheduled here this year include replacing of open telephone wire with buried cable in the Benedum oil field section.

"Growth and expansion are likely to continue for the city's communications system," said Zittle. "Telephone engineers predict that Rankin will have 920 telephones in service by the end of

1975."

He added that a record \$150-million construction budget has been set for Southwestern Bell's San Antonio Area, of which Rankin is a part. The 1972 budget includes expenses for central office equipment, buildings and additional plant facilities, such as telephone cable, in an area covering approximately the western two-thirds of Texas.
