Big Deadline Passes; Candidates Off and Running

Candidates are drawn and the race has filed. They're jolly good election years to be—both statewide and county-wide—with a paper ballot due to 70-some who reportedly filed for various offices.

W. E. (Pete) Snelson announced today that he is a candidate for re-election to the Texas Senate from the 3rd District, which includes 35 counties in West and Southwest Texas.

Snelson is currently President Pro Tem of the Texas Senate and as second in line of succession the office of Governor. He has served as acting Governor on two occasions last year when the Governor and Lieutenant Governor were absent from office. He is seeking to return to this office on the basis of my record and the people of the state," said Senator Snelson.

On the local scene, the six-man race for Commissioner in Precinct No. 1 will likely draw the most attention, simply because it is the largest race in the county. Runners are Shank Bloxom, C. G. Taylor, O. R. Adams, H. Wheeler, Bob Whisman and Hazel Yocham. Yocham, the last to file, told the News that he would have a statement concerning his race for the office at a later issue.

One of the big surprises to many people came in the Sheriff, Tax Assessor - Collector race in which only Pete Bearden and S. O. Langford are running. With Gene Eckols stepping down from the position, it had been anticipated that this, too, would draw a pretty large field.

Over in the McCamey Commissioner race, only two are running, the incumbent, Kenneth La Quey and challenger B. A. Epley, Mayor of McCamey. John A. Menefee is running un-

opposed for re-election as county attorney.

No Republican candidates filed for local offices this year and the only other last-day filing for a Democratic slot is reported to be an Alpine attorney, running for District Attorney in the 83rd District. Aubrey Edwards of Big Lake is the only publically announced candidate for the post.

Members of the Housing Authority of the City of Rankin met last Thursday for their annual meeting and review of year-end reports covering operation of the Rankin Low Rent Project for the past 12 months. Among matters discussed and actions taken was a motion to conduct a survey at this time to determine if there is need for additional units for the local program.

The Authority is interested primarily in one-bedroom units designated for use by the elderly. In addition, if the survey indicates the need, multi-bedroom units would be considered. The Authority is asking anyone who might be interested, or know of

someone who would qualify, to contact either Mr. Travis Bley, the chairman, or J. B. Hutchens, secretary of the Board. If they so desire, they could also inform any of the other members of the Authority: Charles Wheeler, Dunn Lowery, Dean Nicholson and L. Porter Johnson.

"We're not asking people to sign up to move into any units," said Mr. Bley. "All we are trying to determine at this time is whether or not there is sufficient interest in more units for the elderly—enough for us to investigate the possibility of building more."

In their original application, the local Authority applied for 70 low rent units of all types. Ten of these were opened for occupancy some four years ago. They consist of six one-bedroom units de-

signed for use by the elderly and certain disabled persons, two two-bedroom units and two three bedroom units.

Should it be decided to build additional units, the procedure is not expected to take as long as did the original work. A new site or sites would have to be approved since no additional units can be erected on the present location.

"We would like to have the public's thinking on this—pro or con," Bley stated.

Counties added to the district by the reapportionment act of October 15, 1971 are: Bandera, Coke, Comal, Culberson, Gillespie, Glasscock, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Llano, Mason, Real, Sterling, Ward and Winkler.

"The 63rd Legislature will face many momentous decisions in such areas as financing public schools, welfare reform, changes in the area of the state's courts, revamping of legislative procedures and the enactment of a meaningful code of ethics," said Senator Snelson. "I believe my experience can help in obtaining the best solutions possible."

As a member of the 62nd Legislature Senator Snelson serves as chairman of the Oil & Gas Committee, vice chairman of Education and chairman of the local and consent calendar committee. He also served on the committees on administration; agricul-

ture and livestock; claims; constitutional amendments; environmental matters; finance, which handles senate appropriations; legislative, congressional and judicial districts; nominations; state affairs; transportation and water and conservation.

In addition, he is a member of the five-man Senate General Investigating Committee. During the regular session, the committee conducted a thorough investigation in the shortcomings of state banking and insurance laws that came to light as a result of the failure of the Sharpstown State Bank. The work of this committee resulted in the drafting of nine bills, eight of which were passed by the Legislature.

Born into a pioneer West Texas farm and ranch family in Ward County, Senator Snelson is active in the business affairs of the area as the owner of an advertising agency. He is married to the former Susan Sutton and they live at 2406 Shell Street in Midland with their children, Gene, 11; Sandra, 9; Steven, 7; and Shane, 3.

degree from the University of Texas at El Paso and a Master's degree from Northwestern University. He is a purple heart veteran of World War II.

Rare Bird Shot on Rankin Golf Links

One of the rarest shots in golf, the first ever recorded on the Rankin Country Club links, was scored Wednesday afternoon by J. B. Hutchens when he knocked in a double - eagle two on the par five 8th hole. Playing in the foursome were Hutchens, Johnny Howard, Melvin Wimberley and Dwayne Turner.

With a following wind, the rare double - eagle was the result of a driver and 8 iron shot. Turner eagled the hole (3), Howard had a bird (4), and Wimberley posted a regulation par 5.

Each year, several thousand holes-in-one are recorded in the United States, along with an equally large number of eagles. However, only something like 40 or 50 double - eagles are reported each year.

Shooting Coyotes from Planes

AUSTIN — New legislation makes it unlawful to shoot coyotes from an airplane.

Although the law prohibits the use of aircraft to make it illegal to shoot species of wildlife from a plane or to use an airplane to pursue or harass any animal, it does not prohibit the use of aircraft to hunt coyotes. Hunting coyotes from a plane has been a common practice in West Texas. The animals were easy to shoot in open range.

Penalties of as much as \$100 in fines and/or imprisonment are provided by the law.

payments and the local project is responsible for operational and maintenance costs — the Rankin project has always operated in the black.

Cash funds on hand—including certificates of deposit — amount-
ed to \$3,020.22. Of this amount,
\$1,200 is earmarked for future
maintenance and renovation of
the units, a portion is in tenants
security deposits, some is ear-
marked for payment to the City
of Rankin in lieu of taxes, other
portions are in current operations
and \$578.31 is subject to payment
to the Federal program.

With all units rented, the year-
ly rental income amounted to
\$3,841.51 last year. Monthly rent
ranges from \$15.75 upwards, de-
pending on income.

There are no full time emp-
loyees with the Executive Direc-
tor, Hutchens, receiving \$45 per
month, a yard maintenance man,
Mike Peters on a yearly contract,
and a maintenance man, Jim
Wells, paid by the job only.

Since its opening, the project
has had one rental loss of \$35.
