With the degree of Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Houston College of Law, he is also a graduate of the National College of District Attorneys. March 1 is the deadline affecting both those who have not yet secured their voter registration and prospective candidates on any of the numerous seats open on the three boards.

Upton County voter registration is still lagging, according to the office of H. E. "Gene" Eckols. As of Monday, the total number of registered voters stood at only 1950. This compares with 2003 last year, 2130 the year before and 2226 the last presidential election year.
A few are still registering, according to the Tax Assessor's office but, overall, the county is some $300-400$ short of the total possible voting strength.
"We encourage all those who have not yet registered to do so before March 1," said Eckols. Registrations are being taken at the courthouse in Rankin and at the sub-station in McCamey.

With the law requiring voters to be registered 31 days prior to the election in which they wish to participate, 5:00 p.m., Tuesday, February 29 is the latest hour in which they may "get legal". The prospective candidates may sign up through Wednesday, March 1. CANDIDATES
