For All Who Would Run or Vote April 1 --

Deadlines at Hand for Candidates, Voters

For unregistered voters and all who would seek office in the upcoming April 1 city, school and hospital elections, only a few more days remain in which to register or get their names on the ballots.

March 1 is the deadline affecting both those who have not yet secured their voter registration and prospective candidates on any of the numerous seats open on the three boards.

Upton County voter registration is still lagging, according to the office of H. E. "Gene" Eckols. As of Monday, the total number of registered voters stood at only 1950. This compares with 2003 last year, 2130 the year before and 2226 the last presidential election year.

A few are still registering, according to the Tax Assessor's office but, overall, the county is some 300-400 short of the total possible voting strength.

"We encourage all those who have not yet registered to do so before March 1," said Eckols. Registrations are being taken at the courthouse in Rankin and at the sub-station in McCamey.

With the law requiring voters to be registered 31 days prior to the election in which they wish to participate, 5:00 p.m., Tuesday, February 29 is the latest hour in which they may "get legal". The prospective candidates may sign up through Wednesday, March 1.

CANDIDATES

With four seats open on the school board, two on the hospital

board and two at City Hall—plus the Mayor's chair, candidates for the various positions were not exactly shoving to get in line for places on the ballots.

In the best condition candidate-wise was the school board race where all incumbents with the exception of Frank Absher have announced for re-election. These include Ray Barrett, C. E. Taylor and J. A. Weatherbee.

In addition, Donald E. Bailey has announced for the one year remaining on the unexpired term of E. L. McBee. Bailey, a Rankin resident for about two years, is an engineer trainee at Halliburton Services.

At the City Hall, only incumbent Alderman M. O. Price had signed up, as of Wednesday a.m. Other seats open include the Alderman seat of Phillip West and the Mayor's slot, presently held by J. B. Pettit.

With two seats on the board up for voting at the Rankin Hospital, incumbents Jerry Barton and Paul Tharp are unopposed at this time in their bids for return to office.

CORRECTION

In a news item in last week's issue of The News, it was stated that C. E. Taylor, presently serving on the school board in place of E. L. McBee who moved from the district, was a candidate for the one-year unexpired term remaining on McBee's original three year term. This was not correct. Taylor has announced for a full three-year term on the board.

District Attorney Dixon Mahon has authorized The Rankin News to announce his candidacy for re-election in the 112th Judicial District. Mahon, District Attorney since 1962, was County Attorney of Crockett County for several years prior to that.

Mr. and Mrs. Mahon make their home in Ozona. They have two grown children. He is a World War II veteran. With the degree of Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Houston College of Law, he is also a graduate of the National College of District Attorneys. He is a member of the Trans-Pecos, the State, American and Inter-American Bar Associations. He is licensed to practice before all the State courts, the Federal District Courts and the Supreme Court of the United States. He is an active instructor of law enforcement officers in the State Certification Schools.

In announcing his re-election bid, Mahon issued the following statement:

"I believe most will agree that we have good courts and judges in West Texas and with crime increasing everywhere I hope you agree that my vigorous prosecution of adult offenders in the District Courts has helped hold down the rate of crime in this district, actually decreasing the rate in this county.

SIGN-UP TIME—

Some place hereabouts, there's a number of you folk who have not registered to vote. Like the elections, filing fees, etc. there's a good bit of confusion concerning voter registration deadlines.

A lot of people think there is no longer any certain date by which you have to be registered in order to vote in coming elections. This is not true.

You must be registered at least thirty days prior to the date of the election in which you wish to cast a ballot. In the case of the upcoming city, school and hospital board votings, that means you must be registered no later than March 1. You don't have much time left and these are important elections so you'd better get legal within the next day or two.

Should you fail to register in time to vote April 1, you can still

make the Primaries on May 6—provided you register before the April 6 deadline. And this goes on all the way to the November 7 General Election. The registration deadline for that one is October 7.

All very confusing and beyond me why we can't have a cut-off date that would do for all elections—like it used to be on January 31. But then that seems to be the trend—making everything as confusing as possible.

I'd even go one better than that. I think we still should have a poll tax—or something to make it cost a little to get to vote. It seems to me that we had better registration when the poll tax was in use—percentage wise—and people took their voting obligations a little more seriously. It

Incidentally, there are those in
 Rankin, equally as qualified to
 speak on the subject, who will
 give you odds that school consoli-
 dation—forced by the state—is a
 sure thing in the very near fu-
 ture—even to the extent of saying
 that the 1972 session of the Texas
 Legislature will act on it. If a
 school board wants to touch all the
 bases—play it as safe as possi-
 ble to keep a local school — then

there's food for thought here.

This is especially true for Ran-
 kin which—due to its central lo-
 cation—almost certainly will be
 considered as a likely site for the
 consolidated school. One of the
 things that might affect the final
 decision could be the past record
 of the local school board. Strong
 and progressive leadership might
 count for something very real in
 the immediate years ahead.

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Big Tournout Marks Country Club Event

With weather that seemed more like June than February, one of the largest fields ever to play in a one-day tournament gathered at Rankin Country Club last Sunday for a 27-hole low ball match. A total of 50 partnership teams entered—five over the set limit of 45—and still others had to be turned away.
