## Tom Craddick asks

 for Re-Election asState Representative
Midland Republican State Representative Tom Craddick filed today for re-election to the Texas House of Representatives. Through legislative redistricting during the last session the 68th district now consists of the four counties: Glasscock, Midland, Reagan and Upton Counties. Craddick has been elected twice to represent the 70th district which consisted of just Midland County.
Craddick stated that money and taxes would be the main issues in the next legislature. He feels that unless we hold the line on state spending this next year the state will be faced with a Personal and Corporate Income Tax. He said that he has opposed a Personal and Corporate Income Tax in the past and will continue to do so in the next session if re-elected.

## "Fallout" Kits for Upton Residents

County Judge Allen Moore, May or B. A. Epley of McCamey and J. B. Pettit, Jr, Mayor of Rankin, announced jointly today that Upton County residents will soon be able to obtain copies of a Community Shelter Plan advising them what to do in case a nuclear attack on the United States should ever occur. They stated that public information packets containing the information devecontaing the Upton County Com loped in the Upton County Community Shelter Plan have been
received by the County Judge's office and may be obtained by going to the City Hall at either McCamey or Rankin. There is no charge for the packets.
Distribution of the packets will begin April 1, 1972, at each of the above locations. Because of the importance of this material, they expressed the hope that every
family would take advantage of this opportunity to secure a copy of the plan.
"The information developed in this plan could save the lives of thousands of persons in the event of an attack. This information has been the result of careful analy sis and professional planning. hope the people of Upton County will read the information carefully and retain it for future reference," Judge Moore said.
The primary danger to residents of Upton County resulting from a nuclear attack on this country would be from radioactive particles settling over the country after having been carried by high altitude wind currents. These ra dioactive particles emit radiation which can penetrate the average building and cause serious illness or death to the occupants. A nor-
al home would offer little or no protection from this type of radi ation unless the residents knew how to merease the protection of ered by that structure. Because this type of radiation decays or weakens with time, it is possible tor persons who are protected from the early intense radiation o survive with little or no ill el fects. The goal of this Community Shelter Plan is to assure that everyone in Upton County would have this type of protection if an attack ever occured

The latest survey conducted by the Army Corps of Engineers at the request of local officials revealed that the only buildings suitable for use as public fallout shelters in the country are the County Courthouse and the Rankin Junior High School in Rankin. Residents of Rankin can be sheltered in these two facilities. All
other persons in Upton County can be sheltered in the Midland Savings Building in Midland.
Judge Moore explained that although fallout shelter can often be included in the design of new buildings at little or no extra cost, unless and until such future shelter space becomes available many county residents will have to take shelter in Midland or seek the best protection they can find in their own homes.
Judge Moore, Mayor Epley and Mayor Pettit, joined by other city and county officials, urge all citizens to obtain a copy of this handbook and to read and save it so that they will be prepared if a nuclear disaster should ever oc cur.

Detailed suggestions for improv ing the protection offered at home will be included in $t$ he official publication, "In Time of Emergency," a citizen's handbook on nuclear attack and natural disas ters. This handbook is a major item included in the packet to be distributed. The other item included in the public information packet is a plan showing the lo-
