"The decision of the United States Supreme Court in Dunn v. Blumstine has invalidated state laws which require more than 30 days residency in the state or locality in order to be eligible to vote.

"The Texas law has now been enjoined by a federal court in the case of Whatley v. Bullock which was decided on March 31, 1972.

"Persons who have resided in the state and locality for 30 days and have been registered for 30 days prior to the election in which they wish to vote are now eligible to vote in state and local elections. Persons entering the state may register to vote immediately upon their arrival.

"The cutoff deadline for registration for those who wish to vote in the May 6 Primary Election was the close of business on April 5, 1972."



#### WATCH IT-

Absentee voting in the May 6 Primary Elections will open next week and now might be a good time to call attention of voters to the referendum proposition on the Democratic ballot. It's a little tricky and unless you read it carefully, you may not vote the way you intended.

The proposition reads, "No public school student shall because of his race, creed, or color, be assigned to or required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required busing of public school students and provides for equal quality education for all public school students."

The hitch may come when the voter gets to the "required busing" part, decides that he is against busing and puts his "X' in the "Against" square. Actually, to vote against busing, you vote "For" the proposition.

Frankly, I don't like 'the proposition. I don't favor busing but at the same time, I don't think there is any such thing as "equal" education.

Due to the way God has created us creatures called humans, "equal" education is beyond our reach, no matter how many laws are passed, nor how many courts rule on the matter. In any given school, one student will learn more than another. One teacher will better be able to get across to students. One set of parents demand more of their children and on and one you could go.

Race, color or ceed have nothing whatever to do with learning or ability.


As for "equal quality" - if

that means facilities — there again, it's simply not possible. A school as big as San Angelo can offer almost as many courses as we have students. On the other hand, a small school such as ours can give far more personal attention to students than can a big one.

Further, the word "equal" is the catch word in all the plans of the consolidators. They use it at every opportunity in their effort to do away with the small school and to gather all education under one big beaucratic umbrella.

Mostly, I believe, the flap over "equal" education is a political football that is being kicked around by those seeking votes from this or that block. Methinks I shall vote against this referendum until such time as it can be worded a little more to my thinking.



#### Library Notes


The Texas State Library's most recent public library statistics indicate that Texas puble libraries own 11,421,146 boooks to serve the state's eleven milloin inhabitants. The same report shows that the eleven and a half million books were checked out some 32,185,146 times. Each person in the state theoretically read almost three library books.

National Library Week, April 16-22, can give an excuse to browse through your local segment of that enormous state book pile, so that you may see what your local library has to offer. "You've Got a Right to Read," and "Reading Makes the World Go Round" are the dual themes of the National Library Week campaign, which has a state committee headed by U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen.

From the figures reported, apparently quite a few Texans exercise their right to read, and library and book use do make their world go 'round a little smoother.

The Rankin Public Library circulated over 13,000 books last year. This represents an average of 13 books checked out for each citizen in Rankin.


Rankin Library has a good mixture of different media, and in addition to books, offers magazines, records, creative toys, maps, pam phlets and other non-book materials.





