It was another of those little quickies for which Rankin has become famous, a miniature storm that lasted for perhaps two minutes and once it was past, there was not enough wind to fly a kite.

But it was a little dandy while it lasted. Striking at about 3:30 p.m. last Thursday, the freak windstorm came with very little weather activity in the immediate area, filled the air with dirt, tree limbs, trash and rocks and was estimated to have reached a force of between 70 and 100 miles an hour.

Buildings were shaken, employees in the courthouse said that it sounded like a bomb had hit the building, and minor damage

was sustained by some structures. Among these was the roof lifted from a well house at the Edith James home on the East side of town where iron leg bolts were wrenched from concrete and hunks were broken out of the tile walls of the building.

A window light was blown out at Rankin Country Club and some roof damage was reported.

Later in the day several people reported that they had seen what they assumed to be drops of rain falling in some areas of Rankin.

About once a year, for the past several years, Rankin has experienced at least one of these quick gusters with one some four years ago resulting in considerable property damage.

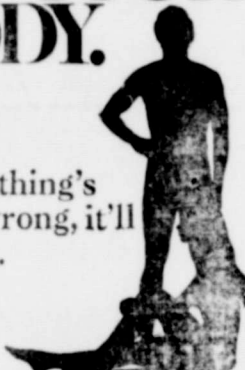

hill, so that vehicles will not be able to pull right up to the edge and force fans to scramble over the countryside trying to get to the bleachers on the West side?

It wouldn't have to be anything fancy and need not cost much money. It would be a nice addition to an already good facility and might well prevent a car being driven—or blown—over the cliff on the North end.

THEY'RE OFF—

Rankin has qualified a nice group of people for regional, both in athletics, arts and the smart part. All of these people have worked hard to earn the trip to

regional and will represent their school and community with honor.

One of the lesser publicized group will be the golf team. One would have to play the game and be reasonably well versed in Class A golf statistics to fully appreciate this group of boys. Actually, they have performed at a very high level all year and have the scores in the record books to prove that they are by far the best golf "team" to ever represent Rankin.

Their score of 312 in the District meet is better than many of the Class A state champions of past years. But in district, they were clobbered. Their chances of advancing past regional — only the regional champion goes on to state—are not impossible, but not good.

Ole Iraan has an outstanding golf team. They were runners-up in state last year, losing only by a stroke or two to Nacona and they have them all back this year. It looks like Rankin is in a situation in golf very similar to the one they have faced for so long in football where they may have been the second best team in the state—except for Sonora.

One thing is in our favor, however—Iraan loses at least one of their top hands next year while we get every one of our back — even to the B team.

A PLUG —

Last week I got a phone call from Gene Hendryx, one of our former State Representatives who lives in Alpine. He called on behalf of the candidacy of Byron Tunnell, seeking re-election as Railroad Commissioner on the Democratic ballot.

Those of you who were around when Hendryx was our representative will recall that he was one of the stronger voices in Austin for what most of us consider West Texas style Democracy in

state affairs.

Hendryx says that Tunnell, a personal friend of his, has made a good Railroad Commissioner and has been most helpful to the oil business. He urges his re-election and knowing Hendryx to be a man of his word, if he says Tunnell is good for West Texas and the oil business, then that's good enough for this newspaper to sup-

port his re-election.

After all, any way you hack it, ninety-eight percent of us in this area will sink or swim, depending on the oil business.

Right now, the oil business needs all the friends it can get. Byron Tunnell should be remembered on May 6 as a man who is on our side.

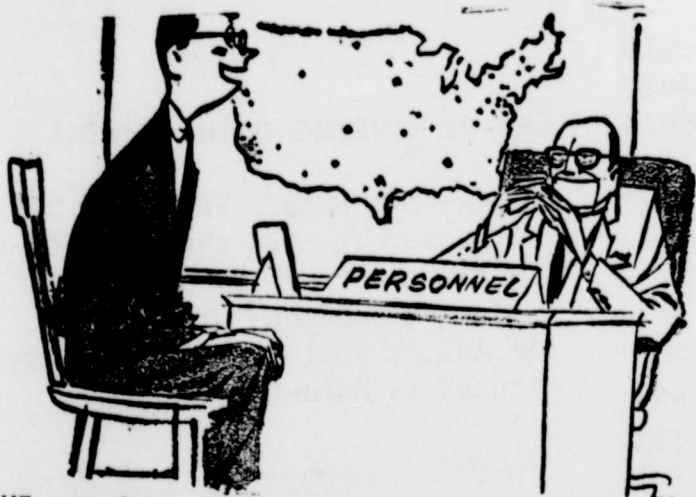

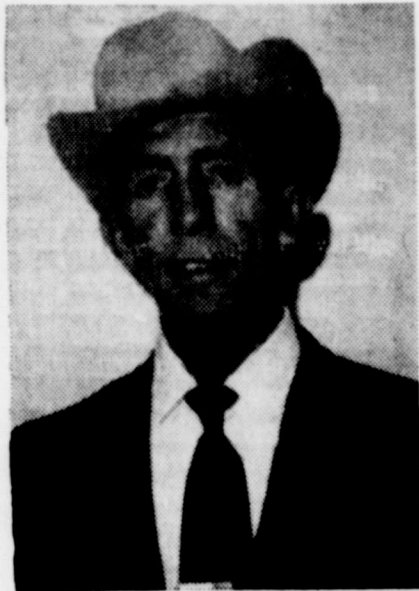

Her fiance was graduated from Rankin High School and is a candidate for summer graduation at UT-Austin with a Bachelor of Science degree in Communication.

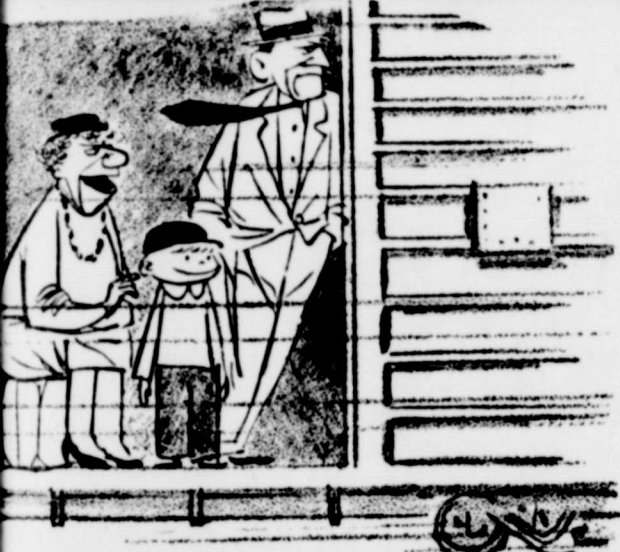


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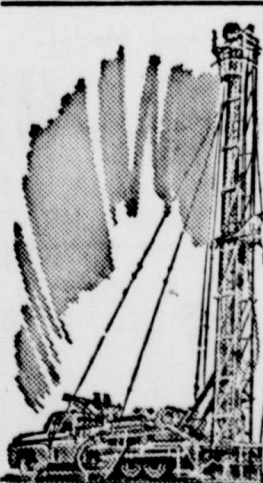
