### Tommy Loughran Ready to Fight

TN THESE drab days of safety-first boxing champions, it is rather refreshing to find one title-holder ready and willing to fight at the slightest provocation. Tommy Loughran, world's light beavyweight champion, is the young man we have in mind.

Loughran won his title October 8 by beating Mike McTigue in a Jurious 15-round bout in New York. In less than two months after he won the championship he successfully defended it against Jimmy Slat-

He was willing, in fact, quite anxious to defend his title again in March, but in view of the fact that no challenger worthy of a chance at the title had appeared he was told to wait a month or so, writes Harry McNamara in the Chicago Herald and Examiner.

Gene Tunney, the heavyweight champion, has defended his title only once during the past year. Mickey Walker, the middleweight title-

holder, risked bis only once against a fighter who must be classified as a setup, Tommy Milligan. Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion, went into the ring only once with his title during the past year and he, too, faced an opponent-Phil McGraw-who hardly merited championship consideration.

Joe Dundee, the current welterweight champion, has not defended his title since he won it almost a year ago from Pete Latzo, Bud Taylor, recognized as the bantamweight champion since he beat Tony Canzonerl in Chicago last summer at the class limit, has also aeglected to defend the title.

There has been no recognized champion in the flyweight class since Fidel La Barba retired with the title intact. Tony Canzoneri established himself as the featherweight champion recently by beating Benny Bass and immediate ly went into retirement with his title Previously there had been no recog nized champion in the featherweight class since Louis ("Kid") Kaplan re signed the title because he was no longer able to make the weight.

#### Fewer Speed Cops Hiding Behind Bushes to Capture Offenders.

"A careful observer of motoring conditions during the past year could not have failed to note that the lot of the motorist was far happier than in any previous year in the history of motordom." says Charles H. Hayes. president of the Chicago Motor club. 'Speed traps did not flourish so free ty. Banditry, insolence and corrup tion, according to the signs, are be

ginning to vanish from our highways." There is a noticeable disposition on the part of arresting officers throughout the country to regard their trusts more highly, according to Mr. Hayes. He states, "There is less of a desire on the part of police officers to ride for revenue only; they are beginning to realize that they are peace officers and trusted with the responsibility of preserving the peace and reducing aceldents. With this attitude prevalent, one found fewer speed cops hiding behind bushes waiting to pounce upon the occasional offender, and a greater number of officers riding in uniform in full view of everyone on the highway. Needless to ay, traffic conditions have been improved by this changed attitude and, of course, motorists have traveled with the full enloyment of their constitutional rights.'

"One of the apparent reasons for this improved condition on the highways," continues Mr. Hayes, "was the decision of the Supreme court of the United States, in which the judicial qualifications of a public officer were passed upon, and it was held that where officers acting in a judicial or quasi-judicial capacity depended upon

a conviction as the only medium of btaining revenue, they were disqualified because of their interest in the controversy." The court in its opinion said: 'It certainly violates the Fourteenth amendment and deprives the defendant in a criminal case of due process of law to subject his liberty or property to the judgment of the court, the judge of which has a direct personal, substantial, pecuniary interest in reaching a conclusion against him in his case."




## Battery Fluid Is Made Mostly of Cornstarch

Giving special emphasis to the in effectiveness of battery "dopes" and patented mixtures which are alleged to "charge batteries, reduce internal resistance, remove sulphation prevent freezing," the National Better Business bureau has issued its an ual report concerning its activities in the battery field

After stating that the outstanding battery "dope" coming to the bureau's attention during the past year was composed essentially of cornstarch the report points out that the adver tisers of battery compounds general ly are not making the blanket claims for their product which was the custom several years ago. Many no longer claim that their compound will "charge batteries."

The report details at some length the co-operation which legitimate battery manufacturers have given the national bureau. In connection with the advertising of so-called "eliminators" the work of the bureau is of particular interest. Early in 1927. advertisers were offering products of varying construction without differentiating their merchandise from competitive units in any manner. It was the practice to describe these pnits as A and B "battery eliminators" and to point to the many disadvantages of batteries and battery-operated radios.

In a recent survey 50 advertisers described their units in accordance with the bureau's recommendations and only seven used the negative term 20. Then add the number of the line "eliminator."

#### Children Grow Slowly.

KANSAS CITY .- Charts comparing the growth of children with that of farmyard animals have been worked out by Dr. Samuel Brody of the Missouri Agricultural Experimental Station.

Dr. Brody shows that a child between four and fourteen years grows at the rate of only 10 per cent a year, whereas young farm animals grow at the rate of 1,000 per cent in a year. This means young animal gains as much as the child gains in a year.
