With four games already in the record books, the Dodgers have vet to taste defeat in the Rankin Little League action, Their record stands at 4-0.





already have. Another is, you all know the runners as well as I do. Finally, this newspaper can and will get along with the candidate picked by the voters.


FINAL NOTE-

in Amarillo. It was addressed to Mr. Shultz, Band Members, Sponsors and Drivers and Parents of the Band, and reads as follows:





Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials remind Texas boaters that they need only register their boats with the department in order to operate the crafts in the state's public waters. The U. S. Coast Guard said the registration of boats is the responsibility of state governments except in the states of New Hamp shire, Washington, Alaska and the District of Columbia, where it is the responsibility of the Coast Guard.

Boat owners must now display expiration "stickers", just as do automobiles, showing dates of registration, boat regisstration no., etc.





Total recovery to date for these Upton County entities amounts to \$1,327.43, according to the Attorney General's office.


Attorney General Crawford Martin said the most recent refund boosts Texas' total recovery to more than \$1.1 million in the past year, and that more would be coming.
