Light Turnout in Saturday Vote

Last Saturday's Primary Elections in Upton County saw what may have been a new record set in numbers of registered voters who failed to mark a ballot. Of the total 2337 registered voters in the county, only 1454 bothered to ballot in the Democratic portion of the voting and 10 cast Republican ballots — 7 in Rankin and 3 in McCamey — for approximately a 62 percent turnout.

George Wallace is Leader in Local Prect. Convention

Two Precinct conventions were held in Rankin last Saturday evening with results that might be termed surprising.

With some sixteen people on hand in Precinct 1, George Wallace drew strong support for the Democratic Party's Presidential nominee in the November General election Wallace received 7 of the Precinct's 10 delegate votes to the County Convention which is to be held Saturday at 2 p.m. in the courthouse in Rankin. Scoop Jackson received the other three votes.

Other Democratic current runners also received support; however, a candidate must get at least 20 percent of the Precinct's support to be eligible for consideration.

In Precinct 2, the convention is to send two delegates to the Saturday County Convention, both uninstructed.

Results of the McCamey Precinct conventions were not available.


Upton voters joined with their district cousins in givin a favorable nod to Aubrey Edwards as the new District Attorney in the 83rd Judicial District while giving incumbent Dixon Mahon a big hand in his return to office as District Attorney in the 112th.

In state offices, the local voters seem to have a bit more trouble making up their minds. The big spender in the Governors race, Dolph Briscoe, was the leading vote getter in the County The remainder of the votes in that particular race were scatter-but did not receive a majority. ed.

For U. S. Senator, Uptonians liked Barefoot Sanders best; how ever, he, neither could muster a majority. For Lt .Governor, Bill Hobby was the top vote getter—also failing to swing the majority.

In the uncontested races, top vote getter was State Senator W. E. (Pete) Snelson who had 1168 of the 1454 voters mark his name. Second highest was John A. Menefee who received 1143.

In contested races, Sid Langford was the favorite with 975 returns in his favor. Aubrey Edwards of Big Lake was second at 944 favorable votes.



Nita Page Chosen as RHS Student to Science Symposium

Nita Page, a student at Rankin High School, has been selected to attend the 12th Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools at the University of Texas at Austin June 5-8.

Roy Johnson, science teacher at RHS, will accompany her to the symposium.

West Texas Utilities Company, a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, joining with the University in putting on the symposium, will sponsor them.

Some 500 outstanding science students and their teachers from throughout the state are selected by their schools to attend the four-day meeting. Scientists and engineers for industry and education will discuss nuclear physics, nuclear engineering and related topics.

Two afternoons will be spent

touring the science laboratories at the university, including those where expirements sponsored by the Texas Energy Research Foundation are being carried on in the thermonuclear (fusion) research

"We are pleased that we can make this opportunity available to these young people," Roff W. Hardy, President of West Texas Utilities Company said. "Attending the symposium should provide them with an excellent opportunity for learning more about the latest achievements in nuclear science."

Speaking at the opening session will be Dr. John J. McKetta, the chairman of the National Energy Policy Committee appointed by President Nixon.

Other noted speakers will include Dr. Stephen J. Gage of the White House Office of Science and Technology in Washington, D. C.; Dr. W. E. Drummond, director of the center for plasma physics and controlled thermonuclear research at the University of Texas; Dr. Harvey L. Cromroy, professor of entomology and nematology in the division of nuclear science at the University of Florida.

Also, Dr. R. E. Wainerdi, vice

president for academic affairs and professor of chemical engineering at Texas A&M; and Dr. Frank B. Salisbury of Utah State's department of plant science.

Dr. Samuel P. Ellison, Jr., dean of the college of natural science at the university in Austin, is chairman of the symposium.

Mr. Hardy said that West Texas Utilities Company is vitally interested in the foundation's nuclear fusion research program at the university as an important potential source of energy for electric power generation.

"Also, through our association with the university in this program," he said, "we are helping provide a field of research for some 80 graduate and undergraduate students from all over the state, and it gives us the opportunity to sponsor these annual high school symposiums."






