You run into some interesting things when you're out going from door to door seeking votes. That is what most of the candidates tell me.

For some of those who have made recent campaigns, it was and is an all new experience — being their first time to make a race. This applies particularly to candidates from the bigger towns who always seem somewhat a-mazed at the friendly and cordial manner in which they are received in Rankin.

I've heard that you don't do much door to door work when you run in a big town. People don't seem to appreciate it much when a candidate comes to their door.

JUNK CARS-

A year or so ago a small effort was made in Rankin to do a little cleaning up. One of the main projects was the removal of junk cars. Some success was had in that department and about a dozen old hulls were removed to the city dump.

But junk cars seem to have a habit of coming back something like crab grass in a yard. You get rid of a couple and three or four more turn up.

It is interesting to note that other area towns have this same problem and the solution most recently being tried is a city ordinance. Crane adopted one last year and McCamey is now in the process of getting one on the books.

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
