Oil - Gas Still Big in Upton Economy --

Upton County Ranks 24th in Texas Oil-Gas Production

Sale of Upton County oil and gas production accounted for \$59,-081,884 of the county's economic output for 1971, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn.

In producing 14,665,727 barrels of crude oil and 49 billion cu. ft. of natural gas, the county ranker 24 in Texas Value of its crude oil was \$51,623,359; natural gas value was \$7,458,525.

The county is among 190 Texas counties with oil and gas production value topping \$100,000, although 211 counties produce oil and gas.

"Upton County oil and gas wells made a significant contribution to Texas' share of the nation's energy needs last year, but growing demand is sapping reserves in Texas faster than they can be replaced," Robert A. Buschman, Association president, said. "As fewer new fields are discovered, due to less drilling, the continuing strong economy and tax base of many Texas counties may now depend on updating Texas oil conservation laws to encourage wider use of new recovery technology," he said.

The Association study showed that Upton County farmers, ranchers and other royalty owners received \$7,385,236 as their share of the production.

The county's wells generated

\$2,374,675 in crude oil production taxes for state government and \$559,389 in state taxes on natural gas. Oil and gas producers spent \$2,320.808 in drilling 30 wells in the county last year, \$85,724 of which was lost in drilling 2 dry holes.

Texas Employment Commission figures showed 517 oil and gas industry employees in the county last year, with an annual payroll of \$4,538,268.

Processing plants also added to the county's economy. The Oil and Gas Journal lists five natural gasoline plants, with a daily combined capacity of 167 million cu. ft.

Equipment Here for Airconditioning

Wednesday morning two large truck loads of equipment arrived in Rankin to mark the beginning of installation of a new cooling and heating system in the Rankin Schools. Refrigerated air is to be installed in all classrooms by next August.

A contract for the work in the amount of \$101,043 was awarded by Rankin School Board in May to Air-Way Sheet Metal, Inc., an Odessa firm.



students and teachers attending the session were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists.

The Foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and lagrest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear energy. Currently, the Foundation and General Dynamics Corporation are jointly sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research amied at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power. Fusion is the energy process of the sun and stars.

The goal of the Foundation and WTU is not research alone, but to also assist in the advancement of the knowledge of nuclear science in Texas schools. Of special interest to the sponsors is bringing to students and teachers a realization of the privilieges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of nuclear energy presents.

WTU paid all expenses for the 22 students and teachers attending from schools in the area served by the company. Lecturers at the Symposium were chosen from top men in their field. They are from various colleges and universities throughout the country, as well as Office of Science and Technology, Washington, D. C.,



Procedures for treating screwworm cases in Texas have been announced by Dr. M. E. Meadows, Jr., director of the Screwworm Eradication Program based here.

All confirmed cases are being treated by sterile fly drops, he emphasized.

The extreme South Texas area, where heaviest infestation is occurring, is bounded by a line that runs north of Maverick, Uvalde, Medina, Atascosa, Wilson, Ganzales, Lavaca, Victoria and Refugio counties. A grid release pattern is utilized here, Meadows said.

The 'grid' consists of parallel lanes, flown 10 miles apart north and south, and also lanes ten miles apart east and west, once a week to establish a total coverage of 1,600 sterile flies per

square mile.

"Also, on alternate weeks, these lanes are flown between the prior lanes, making swaths five miles apart both directions, every two weeks. Within this grid, cases are no longer being hot-spotted," Meadows emphasized.

Hot-spot treatment consists of 100,000 sterile flies being dropped on a single confirmed case, the program director explained. In a secondary grid pattern, north of the grid described and covering areas having less infestation than the extreme southern part of the state, fly releases are being made at the rate of 500 to 800 sterile flies per square mile.

Within these grids, confirmed cases are also being hot-spotted with sterile flies.

In far western counties of the state, routine sterile fly drops are being made along rivers and streams, including Rio Grande as far as El Paso and all of its Texas tributaries.
