Remaining \$165,000 Bond Issue is Sold --

Board Votes to Build New Gym

Rankin School Board met in regular session Thursday, July 13. Major item on the agenda considered was the decision by the Board to sell the remainder of the bonds currently held by the District for capital outlay improvements and to use the money, amounting to \$165,000, plus surplus funds from a recent prior bond sale, to build an entire new gymnasium.

The Board instructed the E. K. Dunbar Co., financial consultants, to proceed with the selling of the bonds. Money from the sale is expected to be in the hands of the District within the next three weeks.

Although all plans for the new structure are in the tentative stage—no architect has as yet been hired by the Board — it is reported that it is to be constructed on the parking lot area immediately north of the present high school gym. Completion time is expected to take from 4 to 6 months after contract is awarded, making a projected date of completion some time next spring.

As now being considered, it is

to have a seating capacity of approximately 650 with seats to contain backs, similar to those in the present Iraan High School gym. In addition, it is to have dressing room facilities for boys and girls, an office for the coaching staff, projection and film rooms and storage facilities.

To be used primarily by the high school with the junior high taking over the present high school facility, it will bring about some changes in the present athletic working program. Among these changes, as now being considered, will be a switch in football practice areas. Beginning in 1973—it will not be ready in time for use this year—the high school teams will use Knobb Hill as a practice area, dressing in the new quarters. Junior high will use the field across the track for their practice sessions.

The Red Devil A and B Teams will also use the new gym when suiting out for games, boarding a bus for the ride to the field across the track. They will use the old dressing rooms at the field-house across the track for their halftime breaks.

In addition to the football teams that will make use of the new facilities, all RHS basketball units will use them as well as the track teams. It is hoped that the building will be completed in time for use by the track team this coming spring.

Gym Open Evenings for Weight Work

Coach Dwayne Turner announced today that the gym weight workout area is now open from 6 until 8 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday of each week.

- Acceptance of the resignation of Mrs. Jo Ann Sproul as office secretary to the superintendent. The Sprouls recently moved to Golden, Colorado where Mr. Sproul is employed at the Denver office of Halliburton Services. Replacing Mrs. Sproul is Mrs. Diana McNally of Rankin.

- Approved student - football insurance for 1972-73 with Heritage Insurance Company, the same firm used last year.

- Accepted insurance adjustment for hail damages to teacherages and school buildings. Settlement was put at \$3,505.50 for the school - owned teacherages and \$1,354 in damages to school buildings.

- Approved payment of June estimate of work done by contractor on installation of new air conditioning in the amount of \$61,290, leaving a balance of \$39,753 for the entire job.

- Opened bids on gasoline contract for 1972-73.

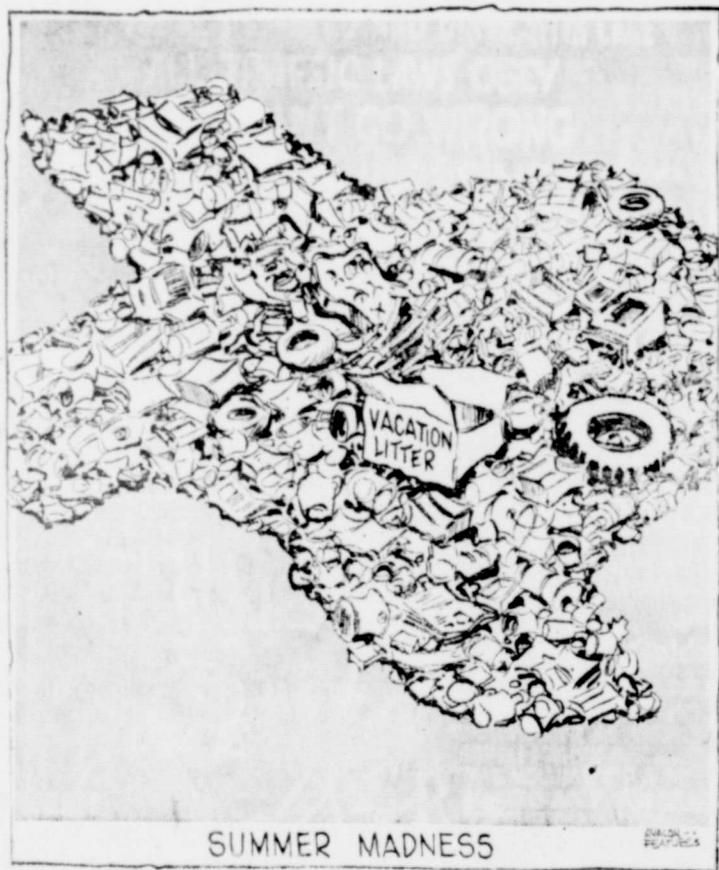

Approximately 200,000 two to four-inch fish were released in the huge Amistad Reservoir and more than a half-million have been released in the waters this year.

Parks and Wildlife fish hatcheries also stocked 5,445 Rio Grande blue catfish in the lake last fall to add to the population of blues and channel cats.

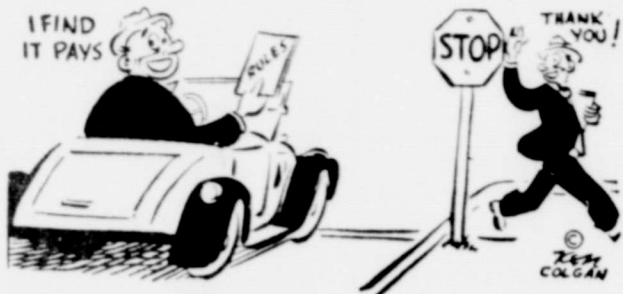
