### Booster Club Sets August 29 Meeting



NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: resentatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

not exceeding Eight Thousand, Hundred (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall re-ceive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Rep-

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read shall be entitled to mileage in "In addition to the per diem the Members of each House as follows:
"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) Dollars miles, the distance to be com-receive puted by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the ad-journment of the Regular or Called Session.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposi-tion: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives." "politics", as advertising gimmicks or sports writers from the big daily newspapers such as in Dallas. And most of them, especially the Dallas bunch, don't know the first thing about football on a state - wide basis and especially about Class A or below.

Most of their selections are made on the basis of what their readers want to read. The best example of this is seen in the fact that they have seldom ranked Sonora at the start of the season—and, most of the time, have had egg on their faces before the season was over.

As for the Harris Rating, the one that puts Rankin at Number 5, it is considered by those who pay close attention to listings of this sort, as being one of the

most reliable. For my selection not because they pick Rankin up high—they are the only one that makes any sense. Their system of selecting has nothing to do with politics or location of a team.

They determine the number of seniors, juniors, etc., the years of experience, their record last year, the schedule played — things of that nature. For example, they may give five points for each senior on the team, four for each junior, three for lettermen, etc. Working with this type of system, they wind up with a combined total points which gives a particluar team's power rating. In the case of Rankin, their power rating at the start of the season has been put at 112,3.

This will change through the season, depending on how we per-

form. Beating a weak team may or may not up our rating, while losing to one will certainly lower it. Oddly enough, with the exception of Jal in New Mexico — Harris doesn't rate the "foreign" teams—Rankin outranks every op ponent on our schedule. Following are ratings of teams Rankin is to meet in regular play: Eldorado, 99.9; McCamey, 97.6; Stanton, 90.2; Wink, 68.6; Clint, 69.7; Sanderson, 89.9; Marfa, 82.9 Iraan, 92.2; and Balmorhea, 68.1.

That indicates that Rankin will open with their strongest opponent—and at a 13 point favorite—on Sept. 8 when Eldorado comes to town, and end the regular season with their easiest, favored by 50-plus points over Balmohea.

All of which is real fine expect for one or two hitches. For one,


